SHOOTING LANDS
FAST DISAPPEARING.

Some persons believe that this country is on the verge of becoming Europeanized to the extent that in a few years we will have no shooting except by land-owners or lessees on their private preserves.

This is something which no patriotic American wants, because we believe that one of the keystones of our national property is the free shooting which our citizens have enjoyed.

There is no question but that free shooting over large sections of the country is seriously endangered and that in some places it has disappeared.

Already States like New York, Pennsylvania and Utah have gone a long way to secure and preserve hunting grounds available for the poor man as well as the rich.

It has been suggested that the hunters' money would go farther in purchasing shooting rights than in acquiring the fee of the land itself.


