This list will be posted at the post office and also at the sub-station in the Bay State Drug Store. Residents of Willimantic and vicinity who desire to take advantage of buying these government stores at reduced prices are directed to write to: Army Quartermaster Retail Stores, Dept. New York City. All mail orders must be accompanied by cash, postal money orders, or certified checks. No un-certified checks will be accepted. The government will insure all mail order purchases that total over two dollars (\$2.00) at their own expense, but any persons buying less than that amount must send the amount of the insurance in addition to the cost of the article. Persons who desire to buy reclaimed or renovated goods can get them at the division headquarters where they will be sold over the counter. No renovated goods will be sold through mail order purchases.
