TESTIMONY ON SANITY OF MRS. GRACE RAMSEY

Testimony bearing on the sanity of the late Mrs. Grace Ramsey of Brook-lyn, N. Y., was offered in the superior court at New London Wednesday and Thursday in the continued trial of the case of Ramsey vs. Davidson.

The plaintiff, Thomas H. Ramsey, seeks to have the court order a deed set aside which a few days prior to Mrs. Ramsey's death was executed by her in favor of Richard C. Davidson of New London, Ellen D. Ramsey of New York and Mrs. Emma Oeser of Lawrence, Mass., conveying to them property in New London formerly used as a shipyard by the late James Davidson.

It is alleged that Thomas H. Ramsey, Jr., and Ellen D. Ramsey, children of the testator, are now of age and are the beneficiaries under the will, which involves property in New York and New London.

On Wednesday the plaintiff's side was called to testify as to the treatment accorded her by her mother and father. She said that they both treated her well, and treated her brother well. She was asked how her father treated her mother, and she burst out crying. She was excused from further testimony.

Thomas H. Ramsey, Jr., the son, testified that his mother was not in normal condition. He mentioned several instances of her peculiarities. He said that there was trouble between his father and mother, but he didn't know just what it was about. He was 10 years old at that time, and he testified that his aunt (Mrs. Emma Oeser) resided at that time with her and contemplated obtaining a separation for his mother, that he was to swear in court that his father was drunk and that he saw him strike his mother, or they would put him in jail. He said that he was ordered to tell these untruths about his father. He said that he never had to tell these falsehoods, because the matter never got into court.

A deposition by Anna Paquet, a next door neighbor of the family in Brooklyn, N. Y., was read. This deposition recited that the Paquet family, who knew Mrs. Ramsey for about 8 years and had seen her nearly every day. She sort of skipped or danced along when she went out for a walk, and she said she saw Mrs. Ramsey perform some peculiar antics which were recited in detail. When the question was reached as to whether or not Mrs. Paquet considered Mrs. Ramsey in her right mind, Attorney Geary entered an objection, Judge Reed overruled the objection, stating that he felt it was admissible as to the impression made upon her by observing the woman for many years. The answer was that Mrs. Paquet considered Mrs. Ramsey "not all there." Other questions which followed and answers given showed that in Mrs. Paquet's opinion Mrs. Ramsey was "crazy but harmless."

Dr. Haviland, of the State Hospital for the Insane at Middletown, was placed on the stand for the plaintiff as an expert in insanity. The doctor was asked a hypothetical question which contained the description of the actions testified to by witnesses concerning Mrs. Grace Ramsey and he testified that in his opinion a person acting in the manner described was of unsound mind.

Attorney Geary on cross examination asked the doctor concerning each specific act, wanting to know if it set itself indicated insanity, and the doctor stated that each act taken in itself was not insanity, but that a sequence of such acts or a group of them, which were pronounced by him as being silly and meaningless, "normal mind" was proof of insanity.

R. Gordon McKay, a Brooklyn, N. Y., lawyer, was a witness Thursday morning for the defense. He testified that Mrs. Ramsey called on him to have him bring suit for a separation alleging cruelty on the part of Mr. Ramsey. He said she appeared to him perfectly rational and knew what she was about; that she was neat in appearance and rather attractively dressed.
