

DEMPSEY SIGNS TO FIGHT BECKETT

Mobile, Ala., Nov. 4.—Jack Dempsey, world heavyweight champion, signed an agreement in Mobile today to fight Joe Beckett, the English heavyweight champion, in New Orleans next March 17, according to announcement here tonight by Dempsey's promoter, George C. Carpentier, the French champion.

EAST NOW PRODUCTIVE OF HEAVYWEIGHT CHAMPS

While the East has been extremely active in bedecking itself with championships in most lines of athletic endeavor, it has been decidedly tardy in one. Not since the days when John L. Sullivan jauntily sported the heavyweight crown on his pompadour has the country produced a champion of the line. In the old days of bare knuckle fighting on the turf, he graduated into the mode of Marquis of Queensberry boxing and lost his title to James J. Corbett at New Orleans on September 7, 1892. For 27 years the East has been able to produce a heavyweight capable of winning the championship.

FIRST SEASON THAT SPEAKER HAS HIT UNDER .300

This was the first season since he became a regular member of the big league set that Tris Speaker failed to get his name among the list of 300 hitters, and odd cousin Tris forfeited his standing because he fell down against some of the weakest pitching in the American league. Tris couldn't fathom Connie Mack's art of pitching on his home grounds. Tris was able to average only .193 at Shibe park, producing there just four blows in 37 voyages to the plate.

NAVIA FIELD WAS ALMOST AS BAD FOR SPEAKER AS SHIBE PARK

Navia Field was almost as bad for Speaker as Shibe park, the Cleveland manager's percentage in the line of the Tigers being 158. In Boston and in St. Louis Speaker hit .250, in Washington .285, in Chicago .312 and in New York .282.

On his home lot the Texan had great success with the stick against the pitching staffs, the York corps proving him greatly. His average against New York hurlers was .248, against Boston's, .312, against Chicago, .324, against St. Louis, .333, against Washington's, .354, against Detroit's, .434, and against Philadelphia's, as told, .500. For the whole year Speaker hit .319 in the games with Chicago, .418 in the games with Washington, .399 in the games with Philadelphia, .289 in the games with New York, .284 in the games with St. Louis, and .279 in the games with Boston and Detroit.

When the Athletics possessed a real pitching staff Shibe park used to be a bad thing place for men like Speaker, Jackson and Cobb, but the general did not have even a fair hurling corps this year, and Tris came down at the bat against some very second-rate curving. His output of hits in Philadelphia in 1919 was two singles and two doubles, all their way gathered in long drives and hits. When the tribe had only one game to play, Speaker and no wages concealed on his person.

On July 23 Speaker got doubles off Scott Perry and Walter Kinney and on September 16 he procured singles off Ray Roberts and Kellar Hasty, two Southern association regulars.
