

WILL HERMANN RESIGN OR NOT?

Cincinnati, Ohio, Jan. 7.—August Herrmann, chairman of the National League's commission, would not say tonight whether he would resign from that position at tomorrow's meeting here of the commission.

Herrmann has repeatedly announced that he was willing to vacate the chairmanship in view of the opposition in the National League to having a man interested in one of the clubs in the circuit further serve in the capacity of chairman.

FINANCIAL AND COMMERCIAL

MARKET WAS RESTRAINED. New York, Jan. 7.—Stock dealings were visibly restrained today, presumably as a result of intimations conveyed to banking interests yesterday by the federal reserve board.

There was much abstract discussion regarding the definition of "unessential loans." Mature consideration of Governor Harding's remarks in that connection led to the conclusion that credit restrictions are to apply with equal force to speculation in leading commodities, especially cotton and gold.

The only echo of the conference at Washington was the announcement of another slight advance by the local branch of the central bank in short time acceptance such action being taken to meet the prevailing rate in the open market.

Banks and other lenders of money reported little inquiry for call loans, which were freely offered at 7 percent, establishing yet another low record for such accommodations since the November reaction, but the supply of time funds was altogether negligible.

General news included the reviews of authorities in the steel and iron industry, renewed emphasis being placed on the prospective demands of the railways for new construction and equipment. Further large orders for copper attracted to the steady improvement in the metal trade.

Liberty bonds were heavy, sales of \$17,750,000. Old U. S. bonds unchanged on call.


