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ASKS BETTER CONDITIONS FOR TEACHERS

All teachers, school committees, superintendents, teachers' organization and welfare organizations in the state are urged in a communication sent out by Stanley H. Holmes, president of the Connecticut State Teachers' association, to convene in Hartford Feb. 13 and 14.

The purpose of this message is to provide information as to the program proposed for the next meeting (February 13 and 14) of the State Teachers' association at Hartford.

It is proposed to devote the program of the February meeting to the discussion of the following subjects which in the judgment of the directors are of the greatest importance for the improvement of the school of Connecticut.

1—Higher salaries for teachers. 2—An improved pension system for teachers. 3—More stable tenure for teachers.

4—A larger contribution by the state for the financial support of the schools in order to relieve in a measure the burden of local taxation, which is already bearing heavily upon many towns and cities.

5—Such changes in state taxation laws or in the distribution of state revenues as will make possible a larger contribution by the state for the financial support of schools.

6—The consideration and adoption of a plan for a state-wide campaign of publicity for bringing the above subjects before the people of Connecticut and presenting to the next general assembly some definite proposals which may result in such legislation as is needed to provide higher salaries for teachers, a better pension system, more stable tenure, and an increased contribution by the state for the financial support of schools.

In the opinion of the directors of the association the subjects should be thoroughly discussed, carefully considered, and fully understood by all teachers, by all school committees, and by all welfare organizations and by all the people of the state.

It is the duty of the directors of the association that such a program may be formulated and adopted at the February meeting, and that action favorable to a campaign of publicity may be taken.

Following the next meeting only ten months will be left before the meeting of the general assembly in the fall of 1920.

THAMESVILLE SPECIALTIES IN NEW BOARD COMBINATION

The Robert Cair company of Brooklyn, N. Y., will head a combination of some of the largest local manufacturers in the east, absorbing, among others, the Thames River Specialties company of Taftville.

The new board combination will absorb the Haverhill Boarding company of Haverhill, Mass., the Pierpont Paper company of Pierpont, N. Y., as well as the Thames River Specialties company.

The companies will operate under the name of the Robert Cair company, but each plant will retain its present name as a branch organization.

Stockholders of the Robert Cair company have authorized an issue of 1,000,000 shares of common stock, of which 600,000 shares are preferred stock, without voting power, and 400,000 shares of common stock of no par value.

The outstanding issue of 1,000,000 preferred stock is to be exchanged for the new first preferred share for share and the present 4,500,000 Robert Cair common stock is to be changed for 245,000 shares of the new common. This is believed to provide a working capital of \$2,000,000.

The acquisition of the three companies to be absorbed by the Cair company will be arranged through an exchange of their shares for the new common shares of the Cair company.

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
