in Pawtucket, R. I., and at the age of 17 took up the jeweler's trade with A. G. Reynolds of Pawtucket. In 1864 he came to this city and entered the employ of J. R. Robinson, jeweler. In 1868 he became a member of the firm of Walden & Freeman and started in business on Main street. Later he ended his business association with Mr. Walden and became a partner of John C. Tracy, the new firm being Freeman & Tracy. He later sold out his share of the business to Mr. Tracy who conducted the business on Main street. In 1893, Mr. Freeman purchased the stores of T. R. Sudd Company syndicate of Bridgeport, Willimantic and Norwich. He continued in this business for a number of years and then retired.

November 27, 1866, Mr. Freeman was elected to the office of town clerk and represented his party in this city as councilman from the third ward, serving for two years. He was a charter member of Obweguesick lodge, No. 1, I. O. O. F., and held many offices in that order.

Funeral services for General Eugene S. Boss were held Tuesday afternoon at 1:30 o'clock from his residence on Windham road. There was a large attendance at the services, many former business associates and acquaintances from out of town attending. The beautiful floral tributes received included pieces from the office employees of the American Thread company. Services at the home were conducted by Rev. A. J. Ferrigno, pastor of the Congregational church, who also read a committal service at the grave in Willimantic cemetery. The honorarium was given to Eugene S. Boss, secretary of the American Thread company; General Lucius A. Barber of Hartford, former president of the Willimantic Linn company; Robert J. Clarke of Holyoke; William Clark of Westley, Peter Hardman, Amos A. Hathaway, Arthur H. Hathaway, John H. Hicker, Dwight A. Lyman, Colonel William H. Hall, of Willington, and George E. Hall, Funeral Director Jay H. Shepard, who was in charge of the arrangements.

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
