

WESTERLY

The five organizations to Westerly were represented at the annual meeting of the Rhode Island State Firemen's league held in Providence and Nelson M. Himes of Westerly was elected chairman of the tournament committee, his associates being William B. Comrie of Central Falls, George E. Shearn of Crompton and John A. Hamilton of Arlington. Officers were elected as follows: George Hunt of Providence, president; J. H. Burdick of Wickford, William E. Comrie of Central Falls, Everett I. Pott of East Providence, George Smith of Wakefield, Edward Brennan of East Greenwich, vice presidents; Daniel P. McLaughlin of Riverside, secretary-treasurer. Mr. McLaughlin was also re-elected as the representative of the league on the state commission for the distribution of the firemen's relief fund.

It was voted that the next meeting be held at Crompton. A committee was chosen to consider the problems of the relief fund with regard to provisions and will have the league support to proceed with an investigation of the existing laws. The committee is authorized to secure legal advice if necessary.

Mary Cappucco, wife of Antonio, has been arrested by Sheriff Mitchell and released under bonds in an action brought by Carmela Manna, who claims damages of \$5,000 for the loss of her husband of Frank Manna, husband of plaintiff. The writ is returnable to the superior court for Washington county Jan. 31.

Frank Manna was held under bonds for the superior court to answer to the charge of enticing Mrs. Cappucco from her home, with adultery, with abandoning his wife and two children and with embezzlement.

Frank W. Coy has purchased from Mrs. Mary P. Savies of Pawtucket the lot corner of Elm and Cross streets, Westerly, which he has occupied as a tenant for nearly 20 years. The lot was purchased by the late Mrs. Rowse Babcock in 1899 and conveyed to her nephew, Sullivan D. Ames, of Providence, and the property was inherited by his sister, Mrs. Savies. It is considered one of the best building sites in Westerly.

After a brief session Tuesday the Rhode Island senate and house, by a unanimous rising vote, adjourned in respect to the memory of Louis Whitman Arnold who had represented Westerly in the house and in the senate for many years, retiring from active politics about five years ago. A joint resolution of sympathy was adopted and delegations were selected to represent the general assembly at the funeral Wednesday afternoon.

Lieutenant Governor Sam Sichel appointed Maurice W. Flynn of Westerly and P. Littlefield of South Kingston as the part of the senate and Cookson Summer appointed Representatives Samuel H. Davis of Westerly, Herbert A. Gates of Charlestown and John B. Edgerly of South Kingston.

There was a large gathering of friends at the funeral service and as a tribute of respect the stores and places of business were closed. Plans were

at half-mast at the town hall, the Westerly High school and the Colonial club. Large delegations of Elks and Masons and prominent men from all sections of the state attended the funeral. The service was conducted by Rev. William P. Williams, former rector of Christ Episcopal church. Burial was at River Bend.

Merrill post American Legion, in annual meeting elected these officers: Bourdon A. Babcock, commander; Donald G. Cottrell, vice commander; Daniel F. Larkin, junior vice commander; James Donohue, secretary; Robert Mitchell, treasurer. Resolution was unanimously adopted recommending to the joint session of the Rhode Island general assembly the election of S. Russell Dower to the clerkship of the Third district court. The resolution states that Mr. Dower served overseas during the war and received wounds that resulted in the loss of his right arm. Like resolution was adopted by Gordon Green post of Hopkinton. The executive committee elected is composed of Robert A. Frostons, Harry Johnson, David Gallagher, Arthur N. Nash and Edward Hawke. The auditors are John Smith, John Crouch and John Mitchell.

Deputy Sheriff Mitchell attached the body of Angelo Cappucco in an action of assumpsit brought by Angela M. Guarino, who claims damages of \$3,000. Mrs. Guarino alleges that Mr. Cappucco broke into land owned by her, caused obstruction to her title thereon, and that the offense continued for several months after notice to quit had been served. The writ is returnable to the superior court for Washington county Jan. 30.

The Norwich Bulletin calendar for Westerly, soon to be issued, will be illustrated with a view of the old Jesse Moss homestead, the site of the present postoffice and Memorial and Library of association buildings. In a fragment of manuscript found among the papers of the late Deacon Ethan Wilcox, first librarian of the Westerly library, is given the following description bearing on the calendar picture:

"Miss Maxson came to Westerly in 1869 and lived with Jesse Maxson in a large two-story house in front and one story in rear owned by Capt. Phineas Clark, and situated where Mrs. Brown's grapes formerly stood (now where postoffice is partially located). Where the Moss house stands was a house occupied by Isaac Champlin. Nearly opposite the Baptist church stood a two-story building with a narrow front, but extending quite a depth in the rear, which Mr. Champlin occupied as a country store. Where the Baptist church now stands stood at one time a small building used as harness and saddler's shop when he first completed his trade and before his marriage. The Red schoolhouse stood where the Episcopal church now stands.

"Miss Maxson says the first circus ever known of being in Westerly was on the lot where E. W. lives. Her uncle took her to see it in the evening. Miss Maxson remembers when a little shoemaker shop was on the corner of Granite near the junction of Broad street, and Daniel Hammond worked at his trade there. He was father of Daniel Hammond who afterwards kept a candy store there."

The republican members of the Rhode Island general assembly from the Third judicial district met in caucus on Wednesday afternoon and unanimously nominated Judge Oliver H. Williams judge of the Third district court. There was a contest over the nomination for the clerkship between M. Walter Flynn and Russell Dower, both of Westerly, the former winning the nomination, 5 to 4. These candidates will be presented to the grand committee today for ratification. Those voting for Flynn were Senators Flynn, Backworth, Wells and Taylor and Representative Gates. The votes cast for Dower were by Representatives Davis, Ferguson, Mathewson and Woodhams. John R. Wilcox was favored for clerkship of Washington county and Judge Nathan B. Lewis for the Second district court.

At the annual meeting of the River Bend Cemetery Association directors were chosen as follows: Charles P. Cottrell, Everett E. Whipple, John T. Edmond, Everett Burns and Edward B. Coy. The directors elected Charles P. Cottrell president and Edward B. Coy, secretary and treasurer. The cemetery was dedicated in 1822.
