There is interest here in the attempt being made to save the Sufield-Berlin Trap Rock Company from a receivership or utter collapse by bringing about a compromise between two factions of stockholders. L. J. Boburn, one of the promoters of industrial place in Danielson was interested in the Sufield-Berlin company, which has exceptionally good trap rock quarries at Sufield and Berlin. This company spans back more than a decade when one L. J. Boburn organized first one and then the other of the trap rock companies, became the defendant named in several suits either brought or threatened by

stockholders, and finally left the state for good. Stockholders muddled the companies together and for the past few years the control has apparently been in the hands of a few, although the stock is widely owned. Much of it is held in western Massachusetts, much in and around Springfield and northern Connecticut, and quite an amount in Hartford, Wethersfield, Berlin, New Britain and off to the south. Many of the smaller stockholders are said to be people of very moderate means and the protective committee is trying to save their investment for them.

Many stockholders received no dividends at all. As a result of the conditions the Springfield interests retained Lawyers A. Storrs Campbell and Arthur L. Shipman of this city at the annual meeting, as was also Benedict M. Holden, attorney for some of the stockholders spoken of as the old line interests. The lawyers for the protective committee plainly stated it was a case of a receivership or a reorganization of the concern and the management. One of the ironies of the situation was that Mr. Steele presided at the meeting.
