GOOD FRIDAY SERVICES AT ST. PATRICK'S CHURCH. Rev. Myles P. The four divisions of the bill are as follows: 1. Land Provisions. To be located by the government in all states where proper land is available. 2. Home Aid—Designed to assist ex-service

persons in acquiring homes in the city or country. 3. Vocational Training. To be given without charge under the board of vocational training. 4. Adjusted Compensation. In the event ex-service persons do not exercise the other options then they are to receive adjusted compensation in cash at the rate of \$1.50 a day for each day of service to be paid within a year from the passage of this act of congress.
