REPORTS ON YEAR'S PLAYGROUND WORK

The annual meeting of the Norwich Playground association was held in the rooms of the Chamber of Commerce Tuesday evening. Miss Elizabeth Huntington, president, reported of the secretary, Arthur I. Pease, was read and approved, also the report of John M. Lee, the treasurer, which showed a balance on hand of \$183.42. The report of Miss Mary McKay, the supervisor, was read and accepted. The election of officers was deferred until the next meeting.

The United Workers, through Miss Culver, the visiting nurse, made a few suggestions relative to the playground, that organization, during the playground period.

Supervisor's Annual Report. The following was Miss McKay's report: The fifth season of the Norwich Playground association was a very successful one. Five grounds opened on July 7th and continued to August 30th. They were located at Lake street, Falla, Hobart avenue, Mt. Pleasant and Greenville, and each ground was supervised by an experienced playground worker and at Lake street there was also a young man to take charge of the boys. The hours were nine to twelve a. m. and 2 to 6 p. m. except Saturday. Lake Street playground was opened during the noon hour also.

The equipment included swings, seesaws, large and small sand boxes, croquet sets. At the Falls there was also a slide and at Lake street in addition to the apparatus mentioned there was wading pool and baseball equipment.

The attendance was less than the season of 1918, due to the unusually rainy weather. The daily average for each playground is as follows: Lake Street 107; Falls 44; Hobart Avenue 3; Mt. Pleasant 49 and Greenville 54.

For the first time in several seasons there was a playground in Greenville. Salaries of teachers and caretakers were raised and nearly all the apparatus had to be repaired. A large part of the equipment will be replaced next season as it will be replaced to repair it further.
