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XXIX—THE FIRST PRESIDENT BY SUCCESSION

1790—March 23, John Tyler born in Charles City County, Va. 1806—Graduated from William and Mary.

1811—16—Member of Legislature. 1815—21—Member of Congress. 1823—25—Member of Legislature. 1825—27—Governor of Virginia. 1827—36—United States Senator. 1841—April 6, became tenth president, aged 51.

WASHINGTON AFFAIRS

Washington, D. C., April 15.—When the fortifications appropriations bill, which carries \$18,833,422 for the fiscal year 1921, was the subject of debate in the House, Representative John Q. Tilson, of Connecticut, who preached military preparedness and especially an up-to-date munitions program for several years before the American participation in the world war...

Colonel Tilson who was in the Spanish-American war answered "embalmed" Lee stuns from a democratic opponent, but said it was silly to hold the secretary of war or the president responsible for the shortcomings of some food inspectors.

Particular stress was laid by Representative Tilson on the production of the Enfield rifles at the rate of 15,000 a day within two and a half years. He gave "the highest credit" for making the rifle program an unqualified success to John B. O'Connell, president of the Winchester Repeating Arms Co., to Harry S. Kimball, president of the Remington Arms American Cartridge Co., and to H. Schuch, general manager of the Eddystone rifle plant.

One member from each county in Connecticut will be chosen as a board of directors at the next meeting when a program of activities will be presented. The membership committee will start a drive to bring in 200 more former residents of the National state within the next few months.

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
Stories That Recall Others
