Westerly lodge, No. 7, of Westery, was represented at the seventy-eighth annual session of the Grand Lodge of Rhode Island, Independent Order of Odd Fellows, and received recognition in the appointment of Henry D. Smith as deputy for the seventh district, and John J. Hoag to the committee on credentials.

According to reports submitted, the year 1919 was the most successful in the history of the order in Rhode Island, with a net gain of 713 members and an increase of \$31,759.88 in the financial standing of subordinate lodges.

One of the most important matters considered was the suggestion of a plan to finance an Odd Fellows building. A committee was appointed to investigate and report at a future meeting.

Among those who received the grand lodge degree were Frank Grand James A. Whaley, of East Greenwich, who is the only army service Odd Fellow in the state.

During the year the total amount paid for relief was \$15,000.00, and all other expenses amounted to \$23,212.62. In the Executive lodge \$39.30 was paid in relief.
