

WESTERLY

Judge Edward M. Burke held a bi-monthly session of the Westernly probate court Tuesday afternoon, this court sitting at specified times in accordance with the town ordinance. In Rhode Island towns it is optional whether the town council sits as a probate court, or appoints a judge of probate; the Westernly town council selects a judge. In the event of the judge being disqualified to act in any particular matter, reference is then made to the town council. At the Tuesday afternoon session these matters were considered:

The will of Lucy A. Saunders, who died May 23, 1920, was admitted to probate. The testator bequeaths nine shares of the Ashaway bank to her son Emery, an oval chair or any other article of furniture to her son William C., and the rest and residue of the estate to her son Nathan. It was stated in the will that William C. Saunders received his full share of the property, during the life time of his father, William Saunders, and was confirmed as executor and bond fixed at \$5,000. Harlan P. Hakes was appointed appraiser.

Ellen Segar Davis, widow of Charles E. Segar, petitioned the court to sell the one-third interest of Thelma Eliza Segar, in the undivided real estate in Main street, Thelma being a minor. The petition was granted and Thelma's share must not be sold for less than \$1161. The property value is estimated at \$7,000. The widow's share being \$2517. Walter Segar \$1161, and Thelma \$1161.

Florence E. Marzoli was appointed as guardian of the estate of her two minor children, Florence E. and Ethel L. Marzoli. Bonds \$100 in each estate. Dante Marzoli was appointed appraiser.

The inventory of the estate of Desire F. Gardiner, showing valuation to be \$1225.50, was received, examined and ordered recorded.

A supplemental inventory of \$33.72 was added to the estate of Elizabeth Moore.
