FINANCIAL AND COMMERCIAL

MARKET WAS QUIET

New York, June 16.—Efforts of pools and cliques to stimulate a degree of public interest in the stock market today were attended with slight success, despite additional bidding up of various specialties, notably several of the closely held issues.

Easy money again favored the professional element, call loans opening at 7 per cent, but falling to 6 per cent after midday.

Reports from other reserve centers indicated no disturbance of monetary conditions. On the contrary, there were signs that banks at leading commercial sections were buying liberally of mercantile paper.

The industrial situation was less assuring, advices from Philadelphia telling of further reduction of operations in the woolen mill. Extensive cancellations and lower prices for finished materials were assigned as the primary causes.

An echo of the recent financial and industrial collapse in the Far East was sounded by the Free App, which referred to cancellations of Japanese business. The Dutch East Indies and even Europe, it was stated, has absorbed most of the Japanese relations.

On more circumstantial merger rumors, issues of the prominent chemical companies made further material gains today, especially General Chemical, Barrett and National Aniline. These were irregularly shaded toward the close, as were the more moderate advances in steel, equipments and rails. Sales amounted to \$25,000 shares.

Trading in bonds was fairly large, the activity, however, being mainly at the expense of values. Liberty issues and the foreign domain consisted. Total sales, par value, aggregated \$13,875,000.

it would then be so unreasonable as to justify judicial interference.

No one saw the accident, but that fact is not fatal to a finding of how it occurred. It occurred within the period of the employment, at a place where the accident might reasonably have been, and where her work required her frequently to be. Her duties required her to use the elevator in going from floor to floor for the purpose of her employment.

Whether she was so engaged at the time of her injury seems to us an inference which cannot be said to be an inference of a character which the reasonable man could not draw.

It is the duty of every trier to infer what has done or left undone although there is no positive testimony of this. And when the appellate court passes upon whether this duty has been judicially performed by legal standard it cannot inquire whether it would have reached the same result; it must limit its inquiry to the ascertainment of whether the inference is so unreasonable as to be unjustifiable.

The court held that there was not "Here," says the court, "the theory that the decedent was injured while on some purpose of her own, outside of her employment, is equally consistent with the theory that she was acting within her employment."

Though this were true it was the province of the commissioner to determine which theory was supported by the evidence. And if the evidence reasonably supported either theory he might adopt that theory and the superior court on appeal could not disturb his decision upon that ground.

The superior court does not weigh evidence in this class of cases; it may determine whether the finding of the commissioner should be corrected or not, or whether there was any evidence to support the conclusions reached. And when it has done this its control over the evidence ceases.

The judgment is reversed and the superior court is directed to enter judgment dismissing the appeal from the commissioner and affirming the award. In this opinion the other judges concurred.
