THREE HUNDRED BOY SCOUTS SAIL FOR EUROPE

New York, July 8.—Three hundred champion Boy Scouts of the United States sailed for Europe on the army transport Pocahontas to participate in the international contest which has been arranged for the Boy Scouts of the World.

This group of Scouts, which will represent the Boy Scouts of America in the contests, was in command of Colonel L. P. Gigniat, formerly of the American Expeditionary Forces. They will go first to England and camp near London for a period of training after which they will go to France to participate in the international meet.

The American Scouts will compete with representatives of the Boy Scout organization of 21 different countries in the contests to decide the champion scouts of the world.

After being the guests of the Belgian and French governments and making a tour of European battlefields, the Scout delegation will return to this country by September 21.

RETURN OF ENEMY PROPERTY AUTHORIZED

Washington, July 8.—The amendment to the trading with the enemy act passed by the recent session of congress authorizes the return of \$150,000,000 of enemy property, according to estimates of the alien property custodian's office. There will remain more than \$150,000,000 in seized property in the hands of that official.

Under the amendment, the "A. P. C." as the office is generally known in government circles, will release property of several American heiresses who married foreign noblemen, property of the German embassy, enemy diplomats, all aliens who were interned, citizens of new nations and states created by the treaty of peace, and women of allied or neutral countries who married enemy subjects.

Americans who were held in Germany during the war and whose property here was taken over, may now recover title, no matter where they are resident.

The amendment also extends the privilege of prosecuting claims against enemy debtors to creditors in allied and neutral nations on condition that the same privileges be extended to American creditors by those nations holding enemy property. There is to be no "informal return" of property by the alien property custodian under the new legislation. It was announced today. The procedure to be followed in securing possession of seized property involves formal application to the president, and filing of a claim on the A. P. C. After the application has been approved and returned the attorney general will issue an order for the release of the property at issue.

SHOULD ABOLISH JAP LANGUAGE SCHOOLS IN HAWAII

Honolulu, T. H. July 8.—The report of the federal school survey commission just made public by Vaughn MacKenzie, superintendent of public instruction for the territory, recommended that the Japanese language schools of Hawaii be abolished. The federal commission was headed by Dr. Frank F. Bunker, chief of the city school division of the bureau of education at Washington. It is suggested that opportunity be supplied in the public school, wherever the demand is sufficient, for the study of Oriental languages in special classes after regular school hours, taught by teachers regularly employed by the territory. The commission report declared that "language schools which in the aggregate outnumber the public schools of the territory are centers of an influence which, if not distinctly anti-American, certainly is un-American. While doubtless many teachers are brought from Japan rather than procured from among Hawaiian-born Japanese because it is sincerely believed they speak purer Japanese, nevertheless, some at least share the opinion frankly expressed recently before the Japanese education association of Maui by Obata Shun-shan, formerly head priest of the Jodo Shu Mission at Puanani on the island of Maui, and principal of the Misuka girls' school. Mr. Shun-shan said: "Any man who is to teach Japanese language schools should not be a man with democratic ideas. A man of strong Japanese ideas should be his teacher."

GERMANY HAS MADE FRANCE NO PAYMENTS

Paris, July 8.—A reparations balance sheet has been drawn up by the French minister of finance. It is intended to show at a glance on any date the condition of the account between France and Germany. On the debit side will appear all expenditures made by the French government which, under the treaty of Versailles, are chargeable to Germany. These will include sums paid for reconstruction for war damages and for pensions. The billions already paid out for these objects make the sheet list heavily to the debit side; the credit column reserved for payments by Germany is still blank.

NAVAL SCHOOL TURNS OUT MANY GRADUATES

Chicago, Ill., July 8.—Nearly 100 men are being graduated every three weeks at Great Lakes Naval Training Station from what naval officers describe as the biggest trade school in the world. The school is devoted exclusively to the training of aviation mechanics and at the present time 3,225 students are taking the courses, which runs in length from sixteen to 36 weeks.

More than 1,000 men have graduated since the school was established slightly more than a year ago, and another 1,000 will complete their work by November. Lieutenant Commander E. E. Wilson, commandant at the school, says all of the 8,000 men provided for in the naval force will be graduates of the school within another year.

The cost of turning out the first 1,000 graduates was \$7,000, making the average cost of producing trained aerial mechanics \$7 each. The low cost was due to the fact that the students produce nothing in their studies to be wasted, instead of making the frequently used examples they work on parts actually needed for repairs and construction of new airplanes. A number of planes, ranging from small land flyers to huge seaplanes, only a step smaller than the famous "X-C" type, have been completed. The school is valued at between \$20,000,000 and \$25,000,000 but all the tools and equipment are salvaged materials which would otherwise have been sold at a great loss after the war. Part of the equipment is several million dollars worth of partly finished airplane motors and parts which were purchased from the manufacturers after the armistice as junk at a flat cost of 25 cents a pound. The students are completing the parts and building machines from them.

Lieutenant Commander Wilson started the school from the bottom a year ago. As the first step the navy officer wrote all the text books to be used. No flying is done but the best men from each class are eligible later to attend a school for enlisted pilots. Each graduate of the mechanics school receives a certificate while gold silver and bronze medals are awarded to the honor men. The 3,225 students now here include 440 marines.

New York, July 8.—Eight hundred million people living in the world's "malaria zone," which practically coincides with the tropical and semi-tropical regions of the earth, are subject to the "crippling and deadly influence of that disease," according to George E. Vincent, president of the Rockefeller Foundation. Residents of the southern part of the United States, Mexico, Central America, the West Indies, and the northern part of South America are included in this

Practical methods for fighting malaria, as used by the Foundation's sanitarians, include elimination of the germ carrying anophelis mosquito by preventing its breeding, the screening of houses against the insect, and the use of quinine to sterilize the blood of human malaria carriers. "Public funds are a necessity in the control of malaria as well as hookworm," the review continues, "and are now being appropriated faster than sanitarians can be found to do the work. Hookworm control has proved a most successful means of convincing communities that health is purchasable thing, and during 1919 control measures were carried on in 15 different states and countries, with a general tendency toward a reduction in the prevalence and intensity of the infection; more efficient and more widespread sanitation, and the education of communities in the possibilities of general health policies."

FRENCH GOVERNMENT TO INCREASE TAXES

Paris, July 9.—The new taxes being voted by parliament will bring the revenues of the French government up to about 23,000,000,000 francs a year, according to expert estimates.
