

BASED ON REELED GOVERNMENT NATIONAL POLITICAL LEADERS

Both Branches of the Legislature Ratified the 19th Amendment, Assuring Women of Federal Suffrage—Accords Females All Electoral Privileges Possessed by Males—Only Dissenting Votes Were Nine in the House—Over the Governor's Veto Bill Was Passed Appropriating \$350,000 For a Dormitory at the Connecticut Agricultural College—21 Measures Were Adopted Changing the Election Laws.

Hartford, Conn., Sept. 21.—Connecticut, through its general assembly, this afternoon ratified the 19th, or suffrage amendment, in a special session convened by Governor Marcus H. Holcomb for that specific purpose. The senate first acted on a certified copy of the federal amendment sent from Washington, ratifying it by a vote of 25 to 2, and the house concurred by a vote of 134 to 9.
