FINANCIAL AND COMMERCIAL

Mark Waf. Unsettled

New York, Oct. 1.—The only appreciable change in the stock market was the more divergent character of the trading. It is believed to improve, while numerous popular industrials and specialties were at lowest prices in many months.

Entrance into the final quarter of the year brought little comfort to the constructive side of the market. The monthly survey of the federal reserve board, which stressed the caution prevalent in general business, seemed to confirm a feeling long existent in high financial quarters.

On the other hand, the rails, it was claimed, are enjoying a boom partly because of a partial recognition of their value, but more particularly because of the benefits they are expected to derive from the transportation of "summer crops."

Among the stocks most affected today were the several sugar issues, which broke 2 to 6 1/2 points, south Porto Rico sugar distinguishing itself by a sheer descent of 15 points on a few transactions. Abnormal trade conditions, notably a disparity between the raw and refined products, accounted mainly for the slump.

The rise in rails was the most impressive of the current movement, most of the junior western and southwestern shares gaining 1 to 3 points, with a gain of 6 1/2 to 3 for Wisconsin Central. Investment transients and grangers were 1 to 3 and coalers, notably Norfolk and Western and Lehigh Valley, made similar gains. The entire list strengthened in the later dealings on reports of a probable avoidance of the British coal strike. Sales amounted to \$95,000 shares.

Foreign exchange rallied from its early depression, although the Argentine rate made a new low record. An 8 per cent quotation represented the high call money quotation of the day and bonds, especially standard rails and industrials, made valuable gains with Liberty issues. Total sales (par value) aggregated \$16,750,000. Old U. S. bonds were unchanged on call.
