C. Tibbets at the place. At the plant of the Thames river division of the Robert Gair company an interesting spectacle was witnessed by a crowd of people Sunday morning when the T. A. Scott company moved the tonnage steam shovel weighing 80 tons from the river bank to the sand bank directly in the rear of the mill. The shovel was moved on rollers over about 350 feet of the Central Vermont Railway company's tracks. A large hopper has been built at the sand bank and pipe laid under the tracks to carry sand and gravel for the cement work on the new building. A steel tower 150 feet high has been erected to which the cement will be pumped and then distributed to the various places through the pipes. There are also three pile drivers at work driving foundation piles. The two houses on the river bank have been removed. The house owned by Mrs. Edward Lattner of Gates Ferry, and which was occupied by Mrs. Dodd, has been moved across the road, and the other, which was owned by Truman Keyes, has been torn down. The bank where they stood has been dug away. Several construction companies are at work and it is expected the new building will be completed in about three months.
