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FIVE PINNED UNDER CAR NEAR BAL TIC

Early Monday morning the Ford touring car carrying Massachusetts registration 210,915, turned turtle at a point known as "barrel curve" near the Lillibridge road on the state highway about one mile south of Baltic. The car contained Mr. and Mrs. Silver Chenette, Miss Ida Chenette, Miss Blanche Chenette and Miss Angelina Chenette, all of Holyoke, Mass.

The party had spent the week-end at the home of Mr. and Mrs. William Chenette of Hunters avenue Taftville. They had left the Chenette home at 4 o'clock Monday morning to go to Willimantic to meet a woman who was to travel with them to their home in Holyoke. As the car approached the curve some part of the steering gear broke causing the car to skid on the trolley tracks, circle and to topple over, pinning the occupants under the machine. One of the young women worked herself from under the car and walked to Baltic in a dazed condition and boarded the 5:35 car for Taftville. Her mother, Mrs. Silver Chenette, notified a man by the name of Fontaine of the accident.

TROLLEY CARS STALLED
WHEN ELECTRIC POWER FAILS
The burning out of a transformer at the Eastern Connecticut Power plant at Thomaston led up all cars the Norwich and New London city lines and the line as far north as Baltic from 6:20 o'clock until 8:15 o'clock Monday morning.

Nearly all the cars had left the barns when the transformer failed and hundreds of working men and women were unable to reach their work on time owing to the tie-up.

It was nearly two hours before the power plant employees could get over into other transformers. The transformer which burned out Monday morning was a spare transformer which had been put in use several weeks ago when a similar transformer burned out.

An official of the Eastern Connecticut Power Co. stated Monday that the trouble was caused by sag getting into the water in pipe coils which will nearly always cause the burning out of the coil pipe.

Fraud in Deed.
Oscar Silverth of Lisbon was Morris Goldberger and Harry Rothenberg, both of Lisbon, for \$2,500, claiming that the two defendants had sold him certain land in Lisbon which the defendants did not own but which was the property of one Kaminski and the Ardnook company, which are now in possession of the land.

The plaintiff claims that the defendants agreed to sell to them for \$9,000 two tracts of land consisting of 120 acres, part of which was 25 acres to be to Amber land and 20 acres of clear and brush land. The plaintiff says that he was shown some timber, clear and brush land as that which he was to receive but which was not included in the deed given him. He, however, accepted the deed and paid the purchase price on the defendants' representation that the deed conveyed this timber, clear and brush land.

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SOLDIERS' INJURIES LISTED—GASSING MOST SERIOUS

According to a comprehensive report just issued by the surgeon general of the army, of the 26,112 soldiers admitted to the hospitals of the A. E. F. from battle causes, more were suffering from gas than any other cause, and more were wounded in the legs than in any other part of the body. Complete analysis follows: Gunshot missiles 83,132, shrapnel 48,448, rifle ball 22,666, shell 21,312, hand grenade 1,156, indirect result 1,323, explosives 946, pistol ball 257, bayonet 245, falling objects 193, aerial bomb 150, cutting and piercing instrument 146, airplane 83, crushing 45, sabre 14, other 3,901.

Another list prepared shows the location of the wounds and the number. All casualties from gas, except mustard gas, are classified under "thorax."

Legs 75,527, thorax (58,984 cases), arms 56,212, head (24,251 facial injuries) 25,312, abdomen or pelvis 19,256, back 5,348, neck 5,356, unclassified 8,823.

This meeting will take the place of the regular November meeting of the clergies.

11 a. m.—For the clergy, celebration of the holy communion, followed by short address.
12:30 p. m.—Clerical lunch at Wauwagan house. For those clergy who are not members of the church the price of the lunch will be 75 cents.

3 p. m.—Meeting for both clergy and laity, with address by the bishop.

SALE OF CHRISTMAS SEALS
TO OPEN IN DECEMBER
Plans for the annual Christmas seal sale, which the state tuberculosis commission holds to raise funds for its preventive and educational work have been announced. The commission has opened headquarters in the state capitol and has appointed Hubert M. Sedgwick state campaign director and Miss Mabel Baird secretary.

The sale will be held during December. It aims to raise \$100,000 to push vigorously tuberculosis nursing and the establishment of clinics throughout the state, to give material relief, such as eggs and milk, and other needed nourishment to tuberculosis sufferers and to pay for sanitarium treatment for patients in some cases.

The state makes no provision for such tuberculosis work with the exception of payment of sanitarium treatment.

NORWICH POSTAL SAVINGS
AMOUNT TO \$128,988
At the close of September Norwich had deposited with the government the sum of \$128,988 as a result of the postal savings plan inaugurated a few years ago.

The net increase in postal savings deposits in the United States for September was \$1,500,000, as against \$2,075,000 in August. The total deposits in the United States on Oct. 1st were \$161,151,222. The number of offices holding in excess of \$100,000 at the close of September was 145, among which are the following Connecticut towns: Bridgeport \$772,193; Hartford \$486,778; New Haven \$450,467; Waterbury \$235,415; Ansonia \$194,774; Willimantic \$168,341; Norwich \$128,988; Stamford \$123,956; New Britain \$100,703.

Red Cross Conference.
One of the largest Red Cross conferences ever held in Connecticut will take place at New Haven on Wednesday, October 27. Officials and members of the state's thirty-eight chapters and the latter's branches and auxiliaries having signified their intention of being present. The meeting will be held in the

Lampson Lyceum at the Yale campus. Plans for conducting the annual Roll Call of the Red Cross November 14 to 20, will be set forth by Howard J. Rogers, manager of the Albany division, who will preside at the conference. Other representatives of the Atlantic division will be present to answer questions on matters pertaining to Connecticut chapters.
