CHARGED WITH THREATS TO BLOW UP WOOLWORTH BUILDING New York, Nov. 3.—Albert Ballin, a naturalized Russian, was indicted today by the federal grand jury on a charge of mail frauds in connection with the alleged mailing of letters containing threats to blow up the Woolworth building. It is also charged that Ballin mailed on May 13, 1920, to Mackay Hayne and Henry Berger, state's attorney and assistant state's attorney, respectively, of Cook County, Illinois, and to the Postmaster, a communication containing threats and plans for the assassination of public officials and the overthrow by force of the government.

65,000 BALES OF RUGS, CARPETS AND CARPETINGS AT AUCTION New York, Nov. 3.—Announcement was made today by one of the largest carpet concerns in the country of an auction sale of 65,000 bales of rugs, carpets and carpetings to take place November 9, in New York. New prices for spring furs made as of October 1, guaranteed to March 1, and the auction announcement is a surprise in the shoe covering trade. Anticipation on sales accounts and bills is set down at 10 per cent, an unusually high rate of discount.

WANDERER TO SERVE 25 YEARS HAS WAIVED A NEW TRIAL Chicago, Nov. 3.—Car Wanderer, the former army lieutenant convicted of slaying his wife, waived a new trial today when he appeared before Judge Dan of the criminal court for sentence. Wanderer was sentenced to 25 years' imprisonment in accordance with the jury's verdict.
