

GREEN ELECTORS' VOTE TO BE KEPT FROM THE VENIZELISTS

Early Returns Indicate That Premier Venizelos Will Be Unable to Secure a Majority of 25 Votes in the Chamber of Deputies, and Will Be Deprived of Solving the Dynasty Problem—The Government is Surprised and is Prepared to Resign—There is a Possibility of the Soldier Vote Changing the Situation in Favor of Premier Venizelos.

Athens, Nov. 15.—The government in an official announcement this afternoon virtually admits the defeat of the Venizelists in the general elections throughout Greece yesterday. It says it will await the final results and then, in conformity with constitutional principles, resign before the convocation of parliament.

ELECTION A GREAT SURPRISE TO THE GREEK GOVERNMENT

Athens, Nov. 15.—The opposition claims a sweeping victory, even the personal defeat of Venizelos in the city of Piraeus. The election is a great surprise to the government, which announces it will resign if it is defeated. The Venizelists are alarmed, but consider that nothing is certain as yet because the results of 40 out of 2,000 districts are known.

ONE OF WRECKED LAKE FRESH STEAMER SAVED

Were on Storm Tossed Vessel 63 Hours—Great Waves Pounded over the Ship, at Times Washing over the Deckhouse—Members of the Crew Suffered Hardships—No Injuries, Other Than Minor Bruises, Are Reported.

Sault Ste Marie, Mich., Nov. 15.—After sixty three hours aboard their storm-tossed vessel, the 7,000 ton steel freighter Francis J. Widjar, Captain Arthur Forbes and the 27 members of the crew reached here late today on the rescue tug lower an "Albatross," none the worse for their experience except for minor bruises and exposure.

Rescue of the crew was effected at noon today when a tug from the Iowa braved heavy seas to make three trips to the Widjar, which lies in imminent danger of breaking up on Panake Shoals near Whitefish Point. The vessel, according to Captain Forbes, had ground for nearly her entire length in about fifteen feet of water.

From the tug, the ship was driven upon the rocks Friday night and the crew was taken off, great waves pounding over her, at times washing completely over the deckhouse. A portion of the deck was buckled and what hatch covers were ripped off by the sea were torn off by the crew for use in kindling a small fire. The allowed the craft to fill and subjected her to inside as well as outside pounding.
