RED CROSS ROLL CALL AT \$3,696

The executive committee of the Norwich chapter of the Red Cross met Friday afternoon, at which time the following officers were elected: Chairman, Rev. Joseph H. Selden; vice chairman, Ebenezer Learned; secretary, Mrs. Bennett M. Gaines; treasurer, Frederick W. Lester. The report of the roll call chairman was presented by Miss Audrey Geron. The house to house canvass has been successful. Fewer memberships have been secured but generous gifts have made the amount received, \$3,696, nearly equal to that received in the roll call of 1919. But the amount from the business houses is far below the level of last year. The report of the roll call chairman was received and the auxiliaries have not completed their canvasses.

Threats End of Home Service

The share of the Norwich chapter in the amount thus far received is \$2,141.45. The executive committee recognizes with deep regret that it will not be possible to carry out the program of service to which they are pledged unless very generous special gifts are forthcoming. During the past year the Red Cross has been unable to apply to the home service department for temporary aid. So far as the treasury permits these calls will be met. But unless the citizens of Norwich support this service it cannot be continued.

Roll Call Report.

The report of the roll call chairman, Miss Audrey Geron, follows:

The house to house canvass in Norwich for membership in the American Red Cross is now over. The returns are encouraging. Increase since third roll call this year exceeded the amount given last year, and where districts show figures considerably below those of last year it can be directly traced to the depression in the city at the present time and the closing of the mills.

The fourth roll call has enrolled up to Friday evening, Nov. 26th, 1920, 2,890 members. Increase since third roll call, 29 per cent. of which goes to general Red Cross fund and 80 per cent. for local work; one member paying a fee of \$50, all of which goes to national headquarters at Washington. From these 2,890 memberships and donations, the amount of \$29,825.00 made to the chapter, \$2,141.45 is available for use in Norwich.
