TO DREDGE THAMES RIVER TO NORWICH

(Special to The Bulletin.)

Washington, D. C., Nov. 27.—The report of the chief engineer of the war department shows that out of the \$12,000,000 appropriated in 1920 for river and harbor improvements Connecticut is allotted for the Thames river \$2,000,000; for New Haven harbor \$4,000,000 and for the Connecticut river below Hartford \$4,000,000.

Work on New London harbor is to be continued and it is proposed to dredge in the harbor as soon as weather conditions permit work on Pollock Hook channel.

The existing project for the Thames river provides for a channel 500 feet wide and 50 feet deep to Allyn's Point, then of the same width to Norwich. A new project to apply available funds to maintain dredging the river channel from Bartlett's Crossover up to Norwich under an estimated cost of \$55,000, it is expected the work will commence at an early date and that expenditures will be about \$10,000 a month.

Work on the harbors at Stamford, Bridgeport and other places is also provided for in the report submitted today.

FARM BUREAU WORK COVERS MANY SUBJECTS

During the month much important work has been carried on in communities throughout the county by the New London County Farm Bureau. A brief summary of the activities in nearby communities follows:

East Lyme.—The demonstration orchard at Scott's farm which was arranged for at the farm bureau meeting (some time ago) held in this community, was visited by the county agent and fruit specialists W.
