HOPPE LEADS IN BILLIARD BATTLE

New York, Dec. 6.—Willie Hoppe, holder of the world's 18.2 balk-line billiards title, defeated Walker Cochran of San Francisco, 400 to 370, in the second game of the final round of the titular tournament here tonight. Cochran won from the other competitor, Jake Shafer of San Francisco, 400 to 338, in the opening game this afternoon of the final round of the national professional 18.2 balk-line billiards tournament. The victory gave Cochran the right to meet Willie Hoppe, titleholder, in tonight's contest. High runs: Shafer 82; Cochran 88. Hoppe went out in the 23d inning with an unfinished run of 24 after Cochran had taken the lead in the previous inning for the first time by a score of 370 to 368. The score: Hoppe: Total 400, average 18-4-22, high run 101. Cochran: Total 370, average 16 18-22, high run 92.

KIECKHEFER WINS PLACE IN BILLIARD FINALS

Chicago, Dec. 6.—Angie Kieckhefer of Chicago tonight qualified for the finals for the National Three-Cushion Billiard championship by defeating Pierre Maupeou of Milwaukee in the last game of the play-off of the four cornered tie for third place in the preliminary matches. Kieckhefer after losing to Maupeou in the afternoon game by 40 to 48 runs, came back in the night contest and won 50 to 48 in 53 innings. Each man had a high run of six. Tonight's victory gave Kieckhefer the right to play in the finals against Robert Cannefax, present title holder. The finals will start tomorrow night.

HARVARD NOT ON ARMY'S SCHEDULE NEXT YEAR

Cambridge, Mass., Dec. 6.—The Harvard football team will not play the Army eleven next year, it was announced tonight. The Army refused to place in its schedule for 1921 the Harvard authorities said, as the Harvard team could not promise a return game at West Point in 1922 on account of a faculty ruling.

RENSSELAER PREPARES FOR BIG BASKETBALL SEASON

Troy, N. Y., December 6.—The Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute varsity basketball team is preparing for the opening of what promises to be the most important season in the history of the famous Troy Engineering College. Right after the close of the football season more than one hundred men reported in the big '87 gymnasium for the first call to practice, and Coach Paul Graham has found plenty of good material from which to select his team. The team of five is intact, except for the position of center. There seems to be a scarcity of tall men in college who are able to qualify for the position. Harry S. Morgan of Rochester and Harry R. Kallgren and Edward D. Seckert, both of New Britain, Conn., seem to be the most likely candidates, though there are one or two freshmen who seem to show good form and may get a chance. Among the latter one of the most promising is John C. Sherman of Syracuse. The veterans of last season will again appear in the lineup. Captain Neal Drew Howard of Rochester and Harold A. Sparrow of Springfield, Mass., forwards and Edwin C. Eller of Buffalo and Raymond G. Noyes of Troy, guards.

TIGERS AND PENN WILL MEET TO DECIDE SOCCER TITLE

Philadelphia, Dec. 6.—Princeton and Pennsylvania will meet Saturday to decide the intercollegiate soccer title, it was announced here tonight. BIG GROWTH IN TRADE WITH NON-CONTIGUOUS TERRITORIES

Trade of the United States with its non-contiguous territories will make a new high record in the calendar year 1920. In fact, says a statement by the National City Bank of New York, the trade with our non-contiguous territories in the 12 months ending with August of the current year was greater than in any complete calendar year preceding. This term includes, of course, the Philippine Islands, the Hawaiian Islands, Alaska, and Porto Rico. The total trade with this non-contiguous territory in the eight months ending with August, 1920, was \$495,000,000 against \$325,000,000 in the full calendar year 1919, and \$255,000,000 in the full calendar year immediately preceding the war, 1913. In the same month of August, 1920, the latest for which we have figures, the total was \$119,000,000 against \$50,000,000 in August of the preceding year, and while it is scarcely probable that this very high monthly rate will continue during the remaining four months of the year, it is quite apparent that the trade with the territories in question will in the full calendar year 1920 reach \$800,000,000 against \$525,000,000 in the full calendar year 1919.

BOSTON COLLEGE FOOTBALL CAPTAIN MAY COACH NEXT FALL

Boston, Dec. 6.—Captain Luke Urban of the Boston college eleven has been asked to coach the Creighton university football team at Omaha, Neb., next fall, and probably will accept. He was named by several experts as an All-American guard this season, and a crack basketball and baseball player also.

SIX GAMES ON HARVARD'S HOCKEY SCHEDULE

Cambridge, Dec. 6.—The Harvard athletic committee tonight announced a tentative hockey schedule for the Crimson seven. The games so far arranged are: Jan. 15, Williams at Boston; Jan. 22, Dartmouth at Boston; Jan. 29, Princeton at Boston; Feb. 5, Yale at Philadelphia; Feb. 21, Princeton at Philadelphia; Feb. 28, Yale at Boston.

New York, Dec. 6.—Benny Leonard, lightweight boxing champion, has received an offer from George Mulligan, Waterbury, Conn., promoter, to fight, it being him \$15,000 for a 15-round bout in which Chick Simler, of Scranton, Pa., at 133 lbs., will be his opponent. Manager Billy Gibson said he would give a definite answer in a few days.

Milwaukee, Dec. 6.—Pinkey Mitchell, who stepped into the ranks of the welterweight boxers, held Jack Britton, Illinois, holder, to a draw in a ten-round, non-title contest here tonight, according to several sporting writers.

Gibbons Shone as Great

Toledo, O., Dec. 6.—Tommy Gibbons of St. Paul outpointed Chuck Wiggins, Indianapolis, in eight rounds of their 12-round bout here tonight, according to the opinion of men at the ringside. The other four rounds were even. Gibbons forced the fighting throughout.
