The body of a woman of middle years, and apparently of moderate means, was found in the harbor at South Boston. There were no marks of violence apparent in the first examination.

Robert Lewis, a negro, accused of the murder of T. W. Green, a railroad watchman, was lynched at Meridian, Miss., by a mob which forced the policeman who had arrested Lewis to surrender his prisoner.

According to reports received at London the Hotel Castellions of Paris, which is most frequently patronized by Americans, has been sold. The purchaser is said to be the Imperial Bank of Austria.

An airplane of the transcontinental air mail service caught fire and was destroyed in a forced landing two blocks from the San Francisco city hall. The pilot, E. S. Rogers of Oakland, was not hurt. The 270-pound mail cargo was burned.

Mexican treasury department announced the Paris-Mexico Banking company, with a capital stock of 1,000,000 pesos, would liquidate all its claims in a month. Heavy losses to cotton and sugar interests are said to have caused a run on the bank, which was closed.
