Phosphorus was discovered accidentally by white Brand, a Hamburg alchemist, who experimented with lead to find some element that would help transform silver to gold. This discovery, made in 1669, was not regarded then as important, but later developed an importance that was very great.

Americans Great Smokers.

Americans smoke eight times as many cigars as they did fifty years ago, or eight times as many are smoking cigars.

Uncle Sam puffed 15,851,417 in 1870, but by 1920 he has become so wedded to the cigarette that he is smoking them at the rate of over 50,000,000 a year. In less than four years the cigarette consumption has more than doubled.

This year 8,566,028,023 cigars will

be consumed in the United States, reports the internal revenue office. This is an increase, in ten years of 38 per cent. The decade increase in cigarettes is 84 per cent. Smoking and chewing tobacco usage decreased 5 per cent. in the same time.

But everybody doesn't smoke. In fact only 28,000,000 smokers are spending this billion and a half of dollars for the "weed."

"A frightful waste of money," some no doubt will exclaim. But, you say, guess that 25,000,000, mostly men, will reply: "Anything that adds to happiness cannot be a waste!"—New Orleans States.
