### What is Going On Tonight

Pythian Sisters, Purinton Temple, No. 2, meet at 8:01 Main street.

Judge Andrew Jackson Bowen, 76, died Thursday noon at 12:30, at his home No. 17 Prospect street, from pneumonia. Judge Bowen was taken with a cold a few days over three weeks ago, and his days ago this developed into pneumonia. Sunday, Judge Bowen, was reported gaining but Monday he suffered a slight apoplectic shock, which hastened his death.

Judge Bowen was one of Willimantic's prominent men, and took deep interest in the civic and religious welfare of the city. He was dean of the local lawyers and the oldest in years of service in Windham county. As a writer Judge Bowen was well known, his latest book, "Every Man His Own Priest," having had a wide sale.

Andrew J. Bowen was born in Eastford, April 16, 1845, the son of Oliver and Betsey Horton Bowen. His ancestors came to this country in 1810 and among them Oliver Bowen distinguished himself in the Revolutionary war. Judge Bowen's father was a successful business man in the town of Eastford.

Judge Bowen received a common school education in his native town. In his young manhood he taught school in Eastford and Phoenixville. Later he engaged in business in Eastford. For five years he was postmaster at Eastford and was a member of the legislature in the session of 1880 serving on the committee of incorporations. For several years he studied law in Eastford with Judge Richmond and Attorney Elliott P.

TWO SCHOOL TEACHERS WERE CLUBBED TO DEATH Cleveland, Feb. 17.—No trace of the murderer of Miss Louise Wolf, the principal of the Parma Heights High school, and Miss Mabel Foote, 21, a teacher, was found when officers and a posse of more than 200 farmers armed with shotguns and revolvers gave up their search tonight.

The two women were clubbed to death while on their way home from school late yesterday afternoon but their bodies were not discovered until this morning, when pupils on their way to school found them, badly mutilated, lying near a road-way.

The murders were cleared by the police as the most brutal and horrible ever committed in the county. The skulls of both women were fractured and their garments torn almost to shreds. The trampled and bloodstained condition of the ground gave evidence of the desperate battle the two women had made to save their lives.
