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WESTERLY

The fire that broke out at 2:45 Monday afternoon in the partition in the rear of the Barrows building, owned by the Western Candy Kitchen, was extinguished in about an hour by the Westernly and Pawcatuck fire departments, but not until the flames had burned up the partition on the north side of the Lyric theatre, and crept between the metal ceiling and the roof.

Three streams of water were poured into the theatre, and the offices of Deputy Sheriff William H. Caspy and Joseph Spier, together with the Lyric theatre, lumber store, received a wetting.

The Lyric theatre suffered the greatest loss. The metal ceiling and the roof had to be ripped down so that the flames could get at the frame, and several rows of seats were pulled up.

The cause of the fire is still unknown. It could not have been caused by defective wiring because there are no electric wires in the building.

From nine o'clock Monday morning until Tuesday afternoon the Lyric theatre has been recently purchased by the Shore Line Electric Street Railway company.
