New Haven.—It has been announced unofficially that the first formal reception to introduce President-elect James H. Angell of Yale university and Mrs. Angell will be held May 6.

FARMERS WANT NITRATE PLANT AT MUSCLE SHOALS

At a meeting of delegates from the various state farm bureaus held in Concord on the 11th of March the state committee reported on the Muscle Shoals appropriation as follows:

The New England states in convention assembled at Boston after the meeting of the county farm bureaus in New England, request and urge the senators and representatives of New England to support the appropriation to complete the dam at Muscle Shoals and thus make possible the utilization of the immense and valuable water power which may be used; if deemed practicable for a cheaper production of nitrate, E. P. Blagden of Massachusetts, E. B. Cornwell of Vermont, H. W. Sawyer of New Hampshire and W. L. Curtis of Rhode Island.

The bill came before the last congress to appropriate the necessary funds to complete the immense nitrate plant at Muscle Shoals but like many other bills it died when congress adjourned. Under this plan as outlined in this resolution it would be possible to produce nitrate from a nitrogen of the air but the cost would be about one-half of what it is today. This would mean much cheaper fertilizer to the farmer of this country and the reduction of cost of fertilizer would inevitably be reflected in reduction of cost of food products. The bulk of the nitrate used in fertilizer today must be shipped in from Chile. There is no reason why with the immense water power at its command, and with the plant used practically completed, that congress should not appropriate enough money to finish the proposition and make the plant which is now a liability to the country of tremendous value.

At this meeting two other matters of business of considerable importance were taken up. It was voted that the committee be created on cooperative organization. This committee to be made up of one representative from each of the New England states. The reason for the creation of such a committee was brought out when H. W. Tinkham, in his address before the conference, stated that there were 327 separate farmers cooperative organizations in New England. As cooperative work develops these separate units are bound to federate an effort able to be much more effective than they are as small units. It will probably be the duty of this committee to work out some plan for bringing together these separate cooperative organizations into
