BILL TO LICENSE REAL ESTATE BROKERS

Hartford, April 12.—The first step to regulate the real estate business by state law was taken today in the general assembly when the house adopted the bill to create a state real estate commission.

The bill will give large measure of protection to the public. All real estate brokers would be licensed as would real estate salesmen. The commission which would look after the regulations would be headed by the governor and would be made up of five members.

Under labor bills the commissioner on labor and factory inspection would regulate and license more than eight hours a day, or after 5 p. m. or before 5 a. m. Employers or guardians who violate the provisions of this law would be fined \$10 for each offense.

Both branches will adjourn until tomorrow. Judge John W. Banks has just filed with the clerk of the superior court his memorandum of decision on the demurrer of the defendant Lang and Murphy to the first count of the substituted complaint.

The demurrer of the defendant Lang and Murphy to the first count of the substituted complaint and of the defendant Murphy to paragraphs 2, 3, 4 and 5 of said count are overruled, and the motion to separate denied.

The demurrer of the defendant Lang and Murphy to paragraphs 12, 13, 14, 15, 16, 17, 18, 19, 20 and 21 of the first count is overruled.

The acts complained of in these paragraphs are alleged to have been performed by Lang as the agent, employee or partner of Murphy, and paragraph 15 alleges that Lang acting in such capacity has failed to account to the board of water commissioners or the city.

Other favorable reports were on these matters. Providing for terms of the criminal side of the superior court at Litchfield the second Tuesday of January and the first Tuesday of May and October, and the civil side the first Tuesday of February and the second Tuesday of November.

Measures rejected were those to authorize the Prospect Beach fire department to issue bonds; changing the form of the standard fire insurance policy; changing exemptions on the Episcopal academy of the diocese providing for reassessment of tax valuations.

Both branches will adjourn until tomorrow. Judge John W. Banks has just filed with the clerk of the superior court his memorandum of decision on the demurrer of the defendant Lang and Murphy to the first count of the substituted complaint.

The plaintiff in his brief says that the second count of the amended complaint alleges an ultra vires act of the board of water commissioners and re-argues the question decided by Judge Wolfe.

The first count of the amended complaint sufficiently alleges a single cause of action against the defendants Murphy and Lang for conspiracy to defraud the city of Norwich. The demurrer of the defendants Lang and Murphy to the first count of the substituted complaint and of the defendant Murphy to paragraphs 2, 3, 4 and 5 of said count are overruled, and the motion to separate denied.
