COMPLAINTS OVER TRAINS WILL BE GIVEN HEARING

Some time next week a meeting of the merchants, manufacturers and the traveling public in general will be held at the chamber of commerce rooms to hear and consider any complaints on train service. Railroad officials will be invited to attend the meeting. When changes in the train schedules were made both from a point of economy and to meet the daylight saving emergency some of the changes were of an experimental nature. It is pointed out that judges on the supreme and superior court benches particularly have been forced to retire on reaching 70 years because of the present constitutional amendment, although physically and mentally qualified to continue their work on the bench.  
The committee will report the age retirement resolution in a substitute form, it was said last night, in which the words "may retire" will be stricken out. The provisions of the petition are that a judge "may retire" before reaching the age of 75 years. It is pointed out that there is no necessity for the two words as judges may now retire at any age.
