These secondary or "contact" cases during the past year several cases followed the primary case in the household. For instance, two families had six cases each, because they did not have protection from typhoid vaccine.

WILL ASSIGN CASES FOR SUPERIOR COURT MAY SESSION
The short calendar for the May session of the superior court, which was to have been held here Friday, has been postponed for a week.

Assignment of court cases for the week of May 24th will, however, be made here Friday at 10 a. m., by Judge Gardmer Greene who will preside at the May session of court.

At Preston Plains the recent hard frost did damage to tomato plants, strawberry vines and peach trees.

There have been twenty typhoid fever cases reported to date this year, a larger number than for the corresponding period in any year since 1916, according to the state health department.

Nearly 20 per cent. of the cases are infected and "catch the disease" from an earlier case in the same family.

Parents should allow physicians to immunize children against typhoid with typhoid vaccine. It protected the allied armies and will protect the home.

Physicians should insist that others in the family take typhoid vaccine to prevent these secondary or "contact" cases.
