

Benny Leonard Outpoints Rocky Kansas

Harrison, N. J., June 6.—Benny Leonard defended his title of lightweight champion of the world in a twelve-round bout here tonight at the Newark Baseball Club's park, his opponent being Rocky Kansas of Buffalo.

Under the New Jersey law no decision is allowed to be made by the referee, but in the opinion of the majority of the spectators around the ring Leonard cleverly outpointed his opponent. Just before the principals entered the ring it was announced that they had weighed in at 115 pounds. Leonard weighed 126, and Kansas 134. Danny Sullivan of Jersey City was announced as the referee. Kansas entered the ring at 11 o'clock and Leonard three minutes later.

During the bout there were few hard or telling blows struck and Leonard had nearly all of these to his credit. It was rather a clever exhibition of boxing than the vicious fight which was expected when these two met. Kansas was inclined to be the aggressor most of the time, but this was counterbalanced by the champion's cleverness in outpointing his opponent's punches and outpointing him in a great many of the exchanges. The Buffalo boy's best round was the fourth in which he had the upper hand mainly through his superior boxing. The sixth round was game and about evenly divided.

In all of the other rounds Leonard had the advantage. The champion's best round was the eighth in which he landed a right hook to the head, a left to the face and a smashing right uppercut in quick order. In the eleventh two left hand smashes in the face drew blood from the Buffalo man's mouth.

A crowd estimated by the management at 20,000, was seated in the Newark International League baseball park when the first preliminary bout was started. There were two minor bouts of four and six rounds, and then Sam Mosberg of New York, former national amateur lightweight champion, mixed it up for eight rounds with Bert Spencer, of Brooklyn. Although no decision was allowed under the New Jersey law, sporting writers at the ringside picked Mosberg as the winner.


