

REPEL THE VELOXITATS WAYS KEEP THE GREEK OFFENSIVE

Georges Baltadji, Foreign Minister in the Greek Cabinet, Arrives at Front With Secret Mission—It is Believed That the Allies Have Made Fresh Offers of Mediation—20,000 Turkish Nationalists Have Been Equipped With Uniforms Furnished by the Italians.

Smyrna, June 19 (By the A. P.)—Georges Baltadji, foreign minister in the Greek cabinet, arrived here unexpectedly yesterday on board a warship. He declined to disclose his mission, but the impression prevailed that he would discuss with King Constantine and Premier Bourgeois new allied proposals for settlement of the Near East question. Belief was expressed shortly after his arrival that fresh offers of mediation by the allies might have the effect of postponing the Greek offensive.

The reception of King Constantine at Smyrna, it is pointed out, indicated he had failed to win over the Venizelos troops in the Greek army, notably the Cretons, who under the Venizelos regime were the backbone of the military establishment. The entire draft of the senior officers at the front have been replaced by adherents of the Constantine party, irrespective of their merits as officers. Many allied observers mistrust the Greek morale under such conditions, and also believe the Turks have a better general staff, with Ismet Pasha the superior in strategy of General Doumasian, chief of the Greek staff, both of whom were German trained.

ALLIES APPEAL TO GREECE TO POSTPONE OFFENSIVE

Paris, June 19 (By the A. P.)—Great Britain, France and Italy have again appealed to Greece to postpone her offensive against the Venizelos government. This is the outcome of a two days' conference between Premier Briand and Lord Curzon, the British foreign secretary, which ended this evening with the dispatch of a letter to King Constantine asking for an immediate reply as to whether Greece was willing to let the allies settle the Turkish question.

MOORALE OF GREEK TROOPS SAID TO BE UNCERTAIN

Constantinople, June 19 (By the A. P.)—The delay in the predicted Greek offensive against the Turkish nationalists is believed in many neutral quarters here to be due to the uncertain morale of the Greek troops.

BIPLANE GOLIATH WON PRIZE OF 100,000 FRANCS

Paris, June 19.—(By the A. P.) The biplane Goliath today won the Grand Prix of the Aero Club of France, amounting to 100,000 francs, by flying over the 1,500-mile course prescribed for the event. All other entries had been withdrawn or had abandoned the contest.

ANTI-BOLSHEVICK TROOPS VICTORIOUS IN SIBERIA

Harbin, Manchuria, June 19.—Further successes by the troops of General Baron von Ungern-Sternberg, anti-bolshevik leader in Siberia, are reported here. His forces are said to have captured Petrovsky on the Trans-Siberian railroad, midway between Irkutsk and Chita, and to be threatening Chita, capital of the government of the far eastern republic of Siberia. The adviser declare General von Ungern-Sternberg has issued a proclamation looking to the restoration of Grand Duke Michael Alexandrovich, younger brother of former Emperor Nicholas (whose whereabouts have been a mystery for some time).

Troy, N. Y., June 19.—Don Campbell, 31, and Henry Beattie, 18, of Watervliet, were killed, and Scuyler Mocharie, 22, of Albany, seriously injured this afternoon when a giant hydro-airplane piloted by Campbell was wrecked in shallow water in the Hudson River about 1 1/2 miles south of the new federal dam.

As Campbell, the pilot, was banking his plane for a turn, after flying low over the grounds of the Laureate Boat club it fell into a side slip and then crashed down in a spiral dive, the nose of the machine striking the gravel bottom.

FOR EXTRADITION FROM GERMANY OF BERGDOLL

Ottawa, Ont., June 19.—The extradition from Germany of Grover C. Bergdoll, United States deserter, is under consideration by the Canadian government. C. J. Doherty, minister of justice, announced tonight. Bergdoll is reported to have reached Germany on a forged Canadian passport.

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
