Report was made on the membership dues campaign and it was shown that 240 members out of the 475 who had signed for membership had paid up so far. It was decided to have County Agent Harold P. Johnson spend one day regularly each week in the office and Saturday was the day selected for him to be at the office.

CHARLES WILBUR, VETERAN BOAT ENGINEER, DIES SUDDENLY. Charles H. Wilbur, one of the best known marine engineers sailing from New London, and an engineer for 40 years on the old Norwich line, between this city and New York, died suddenly Monday afternoon at his home, 58 River street, New London, of acute indigestion. He was born in Stonington, March 4, 1861, the day when Abraham Lincoln was inaugurated president of the United States.

Mr. Wilbur was first engineer of the New London for a long time, but 10 years ago was made second engineer at his own request. He worked steadily, except for the period of being burned until Monday, coming home on the New London from New York Monday morning. He was stricken ill in the afternoon.
