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FINANCIAL AND COMMERCIAL

MARKET UNSETTLED.

New York, July 29.—Further unsettledness was manifested by the stock market today on renewal of liquidation and selling of speculative issues.

The more seasoned industrial were impeded from pressure but eased in the general revival of the last hour.

New elements of weakness were uncovered by the aggressive bears. Shipping, notably United Fruit and Mercantile Marine preferred, were freely offered on wide-spread conditions, and the cheaper motors proved susceptible to reports of a weakening demand.

Chemical and paper specialties were sold to the accompaniment of lower prices for those commodities, together with labor disturbance. Various miscellaneous issues fell one to two points.

The more stable equipments made partial recoveries from midweek reactions and further advances in prices of raw and refined rubbers induced firmness to the tire group, but a heavy tone ruled at the close. Sales amounted to 435,000 shares.

Call money held at 4-1/2 per cent, upping the calculations of borrowers who had hoped for renewals at yesterday's minimum rate of 3-1/2 per cent. More time funds were available, however, at 5-1/4 per cent.

All leading foreign exchanges were lower, demand sterling falling a fraction under \$3.18, with concurrent weakness in French and Belgian francs, also marks and guilders. Italian and Spanish rates hardened, but a sagging tendency marked the moderate dealings in bills to Czechoslovakia and Poland.

The bond market made further upward progress on enlarged operations with foreign issues the chief features. The new French 7-1/8 were especially strong, also Swiss and Japanese obligations. Liberties closed mostly at substantial gains. Total sales (par value) aggregated \$14,400,000.

CHICAGO GRAIN MARKET.

Chicago, July 29.—Accumulating stocks and diminishing output counted as depressing factors in the wheat market today. Prices closed unsettled, 1/2 to 3/4 cent lower, with September 1.22 3/4 to 1.24 and December 1.25 1/4 to 1.26 1/4. Corn set 1-1/4 to 1-7/8 and oats 3-1/2 to 4-1/4. Provisions closed unchanged to 3/4 cent lower. With receipts here totaling nearly 700 cars, and with even heavier arrivals at Kansas City, the market showed evidence of freeing an export market. The complete stoppage of export demand, in this connection bears pointed out that in three weeks Chicago had received 12,000,000 bushels whereas shipments from here had been only 2,000,000 bushels. The situation was further illustrated by announcement that today's export business amounted to but three cargoes, of which two were for Brazil, leaving just a single cargo bound for Europe. Bullish reports as to the probable size of the domestic spring crop and as to drought in Germany raised the market during the middle of the session. In the last hour, however, selling led by a big elevator concern carried the market downward again, and the finish was about at the lowest level of the day. Beneficial rains put the corn market under constant pressure, although values hardened temporarily when wheat showed a transient uptick. Oats merely showed the action of export grain. Provisions had a general downward slant with more or less to assertions that the forthcoming monthly warehouse statement would be a bedfellow one.
