

BRITAIN WON'T GRANT IRELAND A SEPARATE PARADOX OF IRELAND

While Granting Ireland Uncontrolled Authority Over Education, All Moral and Spiritual Interests, Law and Order, Land and Agriculture, Conditions of Labor and Industry Health and Homes of Her People and Over Her Own Defense, Great Britain Refuses to Comply With De Valera's Demand That Ireland Be Treated As a Separate Sovereign Power.

London, Aug. 26.—(By The A. P.)—Premier George, today sent a prompt rejoinder to the letter of Eamon De Valera, which rejected the British government's terms of peace in Ireland.

The premier's note constituted a firm reiteration of the government's former standpoint that Ireland could not be permitted to withdraw from the empire. He said that he thought he had made it clear in conversations and previous communications that the government would discuss no settlement which involves a refusal on the part of Ireland to accept a free, equal and loyal partnership in the British commonwealth under one sovereign.

Mr. Lloyd George in concluding his note still held open the door for further negotiations with Mr. De Valera and his colleagues if they are prepared to examine how far the government's consideration "can be reconciled with the aspirations you report." He declared, however, that the government could not "promise a mere exchange of notes."

The text of the reply of Premier Lloyd George to Eamon De Valera is as follows: "The British government are profoundly disappointed by your letter of August 24. You write of the conditions of the meeting between us as though no meeting had ever taken place."

"I must reiterate, therefore, that when I asked you to meet me six weeks ago I made no preliminary conditions of any sort. You must remember that I invited you and exchanged views with me at three meetings of considerable length. The proposals I made to you after those meetings were not made in any hasty spirit. On the contrary, my colleagues and I went to the very limit of our powers in endeavoring to reconcile and in fact to reduce the differences between us to a minimum."

"I am reluctant to precipitate this important question at a time when the situation of the present state of affairs is so dangerous. Action is being taken in various directions, which, if continued, would prejudice the treaty negotiations. It would be desirable, therefore, that the negotiations should be terminated. This would indeed be deplorable."

"I do not think it can reasonably be contended that the relations between Great Britain and Ireland are in any way different. I thought I had made it clear, both in my conversations with you and in my two subsequent communications, that we can discuss no settlement which involves a refusal on the part of Ireland to accept our terms as necessary and a free and equal partnership in the British commonwealth under one sovereign."

To Consider Pardon for Eugene J. Debs Miners Halted in March to Mingo

Attorney General Daugherty to Take Up Matter With President Harding Today. President Keeney of Miners' Union Induced 500 Men to Return Home.

Washington, August 26.—Disposition of the case of Eugene V. Debs, imprisoned socialist leader, may be taken up with President Harding tomorrow by Attorney General Daugherty. It was stated officially today at the department of justice.

The final draft of recommendations in the question of a pardon for Debs has not been completed, officials said. Mr. Daugherty, it was said, has made an exhaustive study into the history of the Debs case and its relation to the cases of other offenders imprisoned under the law. His plan, it was asserted, is to present to the president a comprehensive study which would include a discussion of the crime for which Debs was imprisoned and the punishment, the law governing the offense and the penalties provided, the relation of the Debs case to any other cases of the kind, and the particular features of the Debs case individually.
