William M. Johnson of New York has brought a civil suit against George J. Wood of Windham Center for damages of \$10,000 for failure to fill a contract of purchase in full on a property purchased by the defendant from the plaintiff on Aug. 29, 1918.

The plaintiff alleges that on the date mentioned the defendant agreed to purchase real and personal property of the plaintiff consisting of a tract of land of about 100 acres with buildings thereon located on Zion's Hill and a wooded tract of about 200 acres for \$10,000.

The conditions of the purchase to be paid on or before the execution of the transfer of \$2,000 on May 1, 1919; \$2,000 on November 1, 1919; \$2,000 per month commencing Oct. 1, 1919, to the first day of February 1921, and the balance of \$2,000 on a mortgage to be paid in two years.

The plaintiff states that the defendant did not make the first payment of \$2,000 but refused to pay the balance. The plaintiff has and still is ready to carry out the terms of the contract.
