FIVE CASES OF DOG WARDENS

According to Dog Warden Frank R. Tuttle five cases of dumb rabies in Norwich have come to the attention of Dr. F. D. Cole, veterinary, recently.

One of the cases which came to the attention of Dr. Cole occurred in Montville when a Norwich-wagon dog found to have rabies, bit Mrs. Etheridge of Montville.

The discovery of rabies in Norwich has resulted in a quarantine order issued by Mr. Whitteley, state commissioner on domestic animals, the quarantine to go into effect Wednesday at noon.

Mr. Tuttle, the local dog warden, has appointed two deputies to assist him in a strict enforcement of the quarantine order. The deputies appointed are Joseph J. Potvin and Benjamin F. Huntington.

After Wednesday noon every dog in the town of Norwich must be tied up in the presence of the warden or his deputies. No dog shall be allowed to go at large on or after the date these rules go into effect unless the same are restrained except dogs being held by a licensed breeder.

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WATERBURY BUREAU

Thomas F. Brennan, a life long resident of Norwich and prominent in labor circles, died at the Waterbury hospital Saturday morning.

Mr. Brennan, who was 57 years of age, was a member of the Central Labor Union and was prominent in labor affairs here.

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NATIONAL ASTRONOMERS

Over one hundred eminent astronomers and other scientists will gather at Wesleyan university, today (Tuesday) for the annual three-day meeting of the American Astronomical Society.

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

New York, Aug. 23.-Bon vivants of the city were shocked today by the death of the doorman at Delmonico's, a fortune as a doorman in the heyday of Delmonico's downtown restaurant.

250 QUARTS LIQUOR SEIZED IN A HOUSE IN NEW HAVEN

New Haven, Aug. 23.-Federal prohibition and internal revenue officers, under the direction of Chief Agent Thomas McAuliffe, late today raided the home of John Arnone in Columbus street and seized 250 quarts of liquor and 200 bogus revenue stamps. Arnone was arrested and held in \$1,500 bonds for the United States marshal.
