

TICKETS FOR BIG GAME OVERSUBSCRIBED

Cambridge, Mass., Nov. 1.—Tickets for the Harvard-Yale football game in the stadium Nov. 10 have been oversubscribed by 10,000. For the 80,000 seats available applications number 40,000. The 25,000 seats sought by Yale have been secured over 15,000. Approximately 4,500 Harvard applications will be cut. Under the system of distribution some persons, non-graduates of the universities, will get no seats. Others will be held for one seat each instead of the pair applied for.

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
