TOLLS AT THAMES BRIDGE

SHOW LESSENING TRAVEL

The receipts of toll at the Thames River highway bridge for the month of November show that October and the bridge receipts have reached nearly the low ebb for the year.

There were 6,957 less cars of the pleasure type to cross the bridge during November than October, and the bridge receipts show a falling off of \$2,247.55 from October, which in turn, was about \$4.00 less than November.

The net income from the tolls last month was \$5,243.67.

CITY DEBT REDUCED BY \$11,346.03

The debt of the city of Norwich has been reduced \$11,346.03 during 1921. Figures quoted by Alderman Arthur L. Peale, chairman of the finance committee at the regular monthly meeting of the court of common council Monday evening give the present debt at \$1,714,748.44 compared with \$1,726,094.47 last year. Little outside ordinary business completed the 45 minute session of the council.

Steps to prevent any possible repetition of such accidents as the tragic death of John P. Holland who was recently electrocuted in the cellar of his home on Avignon street by contact with an electric light wire were taken by the council in the appointment of a committee of four with power to draft suitable ordinances regarding electric and gas installation in the city. Referring to the resolution appointing the committee, Alderman Gilbert S. Raymond of the public works committee said that although the city is protected by insurance he feels that the council as city officials should do all in its power to prevent such deplorable accidents.

The meeting was called to order at 8:10 by His Honor Mayor Frederick M. Lerou. The minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved. The monthly reports of the street department and city treasurer were presented and approved. The committee on the assessments for street sprinkling and oiling in 1921 and ordered them printed in the appendix to the journal.

Mayor Lerou announced through the city clerk the following as a committee to investigate and make recommendations on the matter of all city relating to departmental work, especially in the matter of the city printing, printing, Mayor Herbert M. Lerou, Corporation Counsel Edwin H. Higgins, City Clerk Weston C. Pullen, Martin E. Jensen and Jeremiah A. Desmond. The mayor was authorized to call a meeting to appoint this committee for the purpose above.

Order For New Sidewalks. A resolution ordering Herman Racovin and Louis Markoff to construct new sidewalks acceptable to the street commissioner in front of their properties on East Main street between North Thames and North H. streets by April 15th was introduced and accepted. Action being postponed until after a hearing to be held the evening of January 27.
