Mrs. Hattie T. Barber of Central village plans to come to Norwich for the winter to spend the winter at the Wauregan house.



NEW PUMPER FOR NORWICH FIRE DEPARTMENT

NORWICH FIRE DEPARTMENT WILL BE WHOLLY MOTORIZED BY NEW APPARATUS

When the two new pumpers and the aerial truck arrive and are turned over to the Norwich fire department, the department will be entirely motorized. The three new pieces of apparatus will be of the most modern type.

One of the pumpers will have a capacity of 750 gallons per minute and the other a capacity of 600 gallons per minute. The pumpers are of the "triplex" type, that is, they will be equipped with hose, chemical tank and pump.

The aerial truck will be equipped with a 75 foot motor truck. It will be equipped with 240 feet of ladders. With the ladder equipment there will be one 50 foot rope hoist extension ladder, one 24 foot single, one 18 foot single and one 18 foot single ladder.

Two croch poles, 4 fire department axes, 2 poles assorted lengths, 2 wall picks, 2 shovels, 1 wire cutter, 1 tin roof cutter, 1 little giant door opener, 2 pitch forks, 2 underwriters standard fire extinguishers, 4 fire department lanterns and rubber buckets, 175 feet manila rope, tackle and block, 1 12-inch locomotive bell, 1 strain horn.

Under "extras" which Chief Stanton succeeded in securing for the truck without extra expense are: Motor ladder pipe mounted 1 1/2-inch up on the main ladder a Brown's life net, 3 feet in diameter and 140 feet of ladder extra.

The general finish of the truck will be black. A box will be mounted across the center of the frame to carry the wire cutters and rubber gloves. The body of the truck will be painted red with the words, Norwich Fire Department on the hood and the sides of the truck.

The truck will be 56 feet long, from the end of the ladder to the bumper, this being 5 feet longer than the present truck. Where it is not for the tractor which will form a part of the truck it would be practically impossible to handle it at the central fire station and very difficult to drive on the narrow streets of the city.

One important feature of the new truck is the fact that it can be run into an alley and the big ladder raised and lowered over the hood of the truck and up against a building.
