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## JEWETT CITY

Ice cutting last winter began a little after New Year's. The work was rushed to the limit and cutting kept up as long as the weather would permit. The ice was fine and the big houses at Dorville in record time. Shea Bros. say that there was only ten days during the whole winter when the harvesting could be carried on. Today the big houses at Dorville do not contain a pound of ice, and the fields carry but a light skimming. In comparison with last winter's conditions, when the crop was just secured and that in all two years ago ice could have been cut for two months; then it got too thick to cut. Ice fishermen on Bennett's cove in the upper Apinook found the ice frozen to a depth of 39 inches, too thick to cut the "hit-up" holes with an ordinary ax. Before the houses were filled, so cold did it continue that 14-inch ice had formed in the open space first cut over. Three inches froze in a single night from quieting time until operations were resumed next morning. Shea Bros. reported Tuesday everything in readiness to begin at the first opportunity offered.
