AGRICULTURAL INTERESTS

CORN MEAL AT PRESENT PRICE BETTER THAN HOMOINY

With corn meal \$5 a ton cheaper than hominy, the dairyman should not use hominy, although it has a slightly higher protein content than corn meal. If hominy is \$1 a ton or more higher than corn meal, it is more expensive to feed. If the difference is less than \$1 a ton, the hominy is preferable. The question is often asked of whether yellow or white corn meal has the greatest food value. There is no material difference, the difference is only that one is made from white corn and one from yellow corn. With the constantly changing relative prices of grain, the dairy ration may be changed frequently to advantage. At present prices the following is recommended: Two hundred pounds bran, 100 pounds ground oats, 200 pounds corn meal, 200 pounds gluten, 100 pounds cottonseed. This is a good ration for silage. If silage is not being fed, use 100 pounds of oil meal in place of 100 pounds of the gluten feed.

DEALING WITH FOX AMONG THE POULTRY


Poultrymen in some sections are finding their flocks infested with fox. This is a new disease which will do great damage unless checked quickly. The disease is highly contagious and for some unexplained reason is much more prevalent than usual this fall. Prompt measures should be taken to check it or the damage will be great. The first symptom of the disease is the appearance of spots on the comb and head, also inside the mouth. In severe cases the glands of the throat swell. If the disease is not checked the bird will die. The treatment is not difficult, and a little care will effectually check it in most cases. The disease is more prevalent in farm flocks because of the greater chance of transmitting it from one flock to another. It is known that one of the chief causes of contagion is the English sparrow, which pass from an infected flock to one free from the disease. This is one good argument for backyard poultry keepers to screen their henhouses with fine meshed wire and keep the sparrow out. If only a few birds seem affected they may be isolated and given individual treatment but if the disease has a firm hold in the flock and any number of the birds are suffering from it, the general flock treatment will be better. The first thing in the flock treatment is to give them a dose of salts. For every 100

WINTER POULTRY POINTERS

Good warm wheat makes a nice breakfast for the birds. Skimmilk is thin looking stuff, but it may be put to good use in the poultry yard. Use a little more clean water on the floors. Keep the towels hard at work. It is a form of health insurance. In poultry raising the breed is important, but the man or woman behind the breed is more so. For hatching purposes take the eggs from the hens that lay best. Build up never let the standard down. As a rule eggs from two-year-old hens give better satisfaction than those from younger stock for the earliest hatching in the spring. Fowls that have been running out may have needed no grit and may even have got along without oyster-shell, but now that they are confined all or much of the time, a supply of these important ingredients of the ration should not be neglected.—Farm Life.

HOW BEEF FEEDING PAYS BETTER THAN SELLING GRAIN

An investigation into methods and cost of beef production in the corn belt, conducted by the United States department of agriculture, covering three years, and 806 farms, shows interesting facts concerning the present status of the industry. The man who feeds cattle is marketing his crops as he feeds them, and therefore is justified in expecting a return equivalent to average market prices for the feeds. Even in the heaviest times short of such a return, he has not necessarily experienced a loss. The corn belt farmer who sells grain sometimes receives more for his crop than the one who feeds it to cattle, but on the whole the man who feeds cattle is in certain limited areas, the man who puts the feed into steers and returns the manure to the land is the one who comes out ahead. The conclusion is based on feeding in Iowa, Indiana, Illinois, Nebraska and Missouri.

CHURCHES REPRESENTED IN BOTH HOUSES OF CONGRESS

Chicago, Dec. 13.—That the churches are well represented in both houses of congress is evidenced by a statement issued by the board of Temperance, Prohibition, and Public Morals of the Methodist Episcopal Church which recently made a survey and issued the following statement today: Out of a total of 425 members of congress 24 are non-members, and church affiliation of 95 could not be ascertained. The following are the church affiliations: United Brethren, Mormon, Independent, Menonite, Dutch Reformed, Evangelical have one member each. There are two Universalists. There are three members of the Quaker church and three of the Jewish church. Five Unitarians, 10 Catholics, 10 Lutherans, 11 Christians, 18 Episcopalians, 23 Baptists, 25 Presbyterians and 32 Methodists.

EXTENSION PROGRAM IN STATE FOR 1922

A tentative statewide program of extension work made up of county programs is a definite result of the conference of extension specialists, county agricultural agents, county club agents and county home demonstration agents held at the Connecticut Agricultural college Oct. 25 to 28 under the leadership of H. J. Baker, director of the extension service. County goals by projects were decided upon at a joint session of county agents, state leaders and the specialists concerned. The purpose of the conference was to develop a unified statewide program of extension teaching. The next step in the plan is for the county extension workers to take up these goals with their county and local committees, and get their point of view as to changes or increases which they feel should be made. The state program of work will eventually represent the best thought of extension specialists, county
