Manchester, England, Nov. 28.—New York is "the principal free gold market, and all the world owes her money, but London still remains the world's financial center. This was the keynote of an address by O. R. Hobson, financial editor of the Manchester Guardian, at a meeting of the Manchester and District Bankers Institute.






