

# PROLONGED PUBLIC SITINGS OF THE DALL ANTICIPATED

## Debate of the Treaty is Likely to Last Over Christmas—Contradictory Rumors Were in Circulation in Dublin Sunday—One Rumor Says That Richard Mulcahy, Chief of Staff of the Irish Republican Army, Will Move Ratification of the Treaty, Which Will Be Seconded by Commandant John Joseph McKeown, Recently Released From Prison, Where He Was Under Sentence of Death by Courtmartial.

Buffalo, N. Y., Dec. 18.—(By the A. P.)—The public sittings of the Dail Eireann, which began today, are expected to continue for several days, and are likely to be interrupted by a storm which is expected to hit the city on Sunday. The Dail is expected to meet at 10 o'clock tomorrow morning, and will continue to sit until 10 o'clock on Sunday.
