STUDYING PROBLEM OF FREIGHT AND TRANSPORTATION

The committee on survey of freight transportation of the Connecticut Chamber of Commerce met for luncheon at the Hartford club this week for its first session. A general plan of action was agreed upon involving the study of changed conditions in transportation caused by the motor truck. This includes problems of taxation, value of securities and service to the public. A more complete programme will be passed upon at a meeting to be held in New Haven next Wednesday. It was decided to ask the executive committee of the Chamber to add another member representing motor truck interests directly. A tentative outline of the range of the committee's work was discussed. Questions which will come up are: How the changed conditions arising out of the motor truck transportation affect the service to the public, how they affect the expense to the public in the form of taxation, and how they affect railroad securities, the value of railroad securities.
