## THE FARMER'S TALK TO FARMERS

### THE STIR OVER THE AGRICULTURAL "BLOC"

(Written Specially For The Bulletin.)  
 Doubtless you've noticed that they've got an agricultural "bloc" in congress. You've also observed with interest the national conference on farm affairs which has recently met at Washington on call from the president.  
 Both are "significant" and also "notable" and "momentous" and "pregnant"—I think these are the proper adjectives which the date of the moment requires to be used.  
 But neither one nor both have half as much significance to my rural mind as the undeniable fact that between them, they've set our dear friends of New York city to worrying. In fact, if one may credit what he reads, they've got not only the metropolitan millionaires but also the metropolitan editors and the metropolitan politicians "all fussed up."

 I tell you they're worried, because they can't help showing it. Anything which suggests a possibility of the great beast of a public having taken the bits into its teeth scares them into Aunt Fanny's "conclusion fix."

They can't imagine just what's coming. They can't make out whether the shadowy figure which rises over the western and southwestern horizon is a real one with teeth or a mere harmless bogey; whether the new sound which dominates the western breeze is only an extra big fit which, or the veritable trum of Armageddon. They don't know whether to turn tail and run, or "boot face and enlist with the new movement; whether to re-locate the amulet and somewhat moth-eaten banners of orthodox politics or keep them out of sight till they clearly see the colors of the new movement.  
 Their predicament is not so bad, however, as that of the cream-sellers and sweetmeat-vendors, who don't know whether to keep on tugging the dunnage, which have hitherto drooled out sufficient official cash, or to "leggo and hurry hot-foot across-lots to catch on behind the new band-wagon. Their souls are simply torn half in two by the uncertainty. They cut loose on a false alarm, then, when things resume their orderly course, they'll be out in the cold with small chance to re-occupy their warm chairs around the cheerful stove of official patronage. On the other hand, if the alarm is a real one, they'll lose all hope of getting into the front seats if they don't start right away or sooner.  
 It's no wonder that all these people are worried. And one can't help finding a certain degree of perhaps malicious amusement in the spectacle of their bewilderment.  
 Moreover, it makes an outsider smile a little contemptuously to observe how thunder-struck with astonishment they all seem to be. They act just as if the storm had broken from a clear sky, without warning.

men have elected to represent us in government have treated our complaints with about the same supercilious contempt they would show to a street urchin who was squalling because a gang of hoodlums had stolen his top. "Oh, shut up! Here's a lollipop; go off and stick it and keep quiet."  
 Now, you and I feel that the farmers of the country are not quite the same as hoodluming street boys. We also feel that an occasional pat on the head and an infrequent lollipop are not sufficient to keep them quiet. Especially when the pats and the lollipops are given by the very servants whom we have delegated to protect our interests, and whom we pay for doing just that.  
 We do not want sweet words and sticky candy. Not to any appreciable extent. What we do want is very simple and very accessible. It is a fair show and a square deal. That's all.  
 We don't get either one. Haven't for a full generation. We have argued and we have petitioned and we have cajoled and we have stormed about it. All to no purpose beyond a few pats and lollipops, as above mentioned. Now the wirepullers are wondering if pats and lollipops are playing out.  
 They talk about the professional politicians always having their ears to the ground. Fanciful! Not even a casual passer-by with ears of merely normal length need have lowered them one inch towards the soil to have heard the ramblings with which for thirty years the farm lands have been resonant. It was long a boast that these same politicians were experts at reading the political weather-stem. Yet now they pretend that they never saw the black clouds on the horizon and never heard the thunder muttering lower and louder as the clouds slowly rose.  
 If these creatures really are such humbugs in their own chosen field, is there a honest and sane man who would ever let their being discarded and dumped into the discard? There's no doubt a host of farmers who would be better off in the henhouse. Certainly there can't be any worse.

You and I don't know what's going to come out of this new agrarianism. We're not politicians of choice and mighty seldom politicians by default. We simply haven't any call to worry about it. There was once a certain man of that ilk whose practice it was to say "Pile's robbing Paul" and who was credited with expecting to "catch larks when the heavens fall." The first procedure mentioned pretty well describes present practice. Perhaps the second event may come to us outsiders. We keep our eyes open and our last-catchin' nets in commission.  
 One thing is cock-sure: neither an agricultural "bloc" in congress nor an agricultural conference out of congress is going to plunge the country into any radical reforms. To paraphrase Mr. Lincoln's famous saying, it is doubtful possible to get most of the farmers part of the time and some of them all the time. But not all of them all the time. A recent experience out in the Dakotas has opened the eyes of many even of the most radical.

And long experience has had some of us to the knowledge that, when New York city says "Gee!" the right thing for the team to do is to "Haw!" at once and unhesitatingly. What New York city says, politicians speaking is an excellent thing for the rest of the country to avoid, each, after very wide of. What New York city disseminates politically speaking, is prima facie a promising prospect.  
 Of course there's always the danger, in any new movement, that the hummers will take charge and lead to a fiasco as they did in Dakota. But, as a whole, the farmers of the United States are the most conservative class of the population. They're more apt to go too slow than too fast. Whatever they may do to the professional politicians should they obtain control, they're not likely to try any belabored ideologies on the plain people. For that's just what they are, themselves.
