

FINANCIAL AND COMMERCIAL

MARKET WAS STRONG

New York, March 14.—The prominence and strength of numerous speculative issues and the uneven movement of shares of intrinsic value today characterized an active but professional session on the stock exchange.

Dealings approximated 900,000 shares, but this impressive total was made up largely of motors and kindred accessories, sugar, independent steel, secondary equipments and utilities, notably the gas group.

Divided paying rails and industrial of the same description became fairly active and strong later, especially transportation, and several of the eastern trunk lines.

Specific features of the advance comprised Consolidated Gas, Studebaker preferred, American Sugar, Cuba Cane Sugar common and preferred, American Woolen, Kelsey Wheel, East Iron Pipe, Southern Pacific, Reading and New York Central at net gains of 1 to 6 points.

Foremost among the backward or heavy stocks were the foreign oils, particularly Mexican Petroleum and the general Asphalt and several of the food specialties. Market street railways preferred cancelled part of its recent steady advance.

Apart from the more unfavorable aspects of the labor situation, as indicated by increasing probability of a strike by the soft coal miners and further wage cuts in the steel and textile trades, the day's news was regarded as encouraging.

London's markets were steadier, this being evidenced by the rally in foreign exchanges in the market. Local supplies of call money were unusually abundant and freely obtainable at private loans at 3 1/4 and even 3 1/2 per cent.

The recovery in the London rate of exchange amounted to fully 3 1/2 cents from yesterday's minimum. French and Italian rates were 7 to 12 points better, but neutrals, including Holland, Norway and Sweden again reacted. South American bills were depressed on selling at this center for London account.

SPORT WORLD BRIEFS

The thirteenth challenge for the Davis Cup was received Monday by the United States Lawn Tennis Association. This was from Rumania, which never before has entered into the famous international tennis competition.

Leading women lawn tennis players will meet next week on the covered courts of the Longwood Cricket Club at Chestnut Hill, Mass., to compete in the national annual indoor championship tournament, and it is expected that about half a hundred will try for the title now held by Mrs. Mollie Bjurstedt Mallory.

American jockeys got off to a flying start in France at the opening of the metropolitan horse racing season by winning three events.

When the Brooklyn squad reported for its yearly workout of Monday at Southside Park this morning, Burleigh Grimes last of the holdouts, was there in uniform. The evident ambition of the spittable ace to get into condition pleased Manager Robinson mightily.

Romeo Naranjo, an Argentine student Monday completed a record swim from Colonia, Uruguay, to Buenos Aires, a distance of forty-four kilometers (about 27 miles) across the Plata Estuary. He was in the water 24 hours 26 1/2 minutes, beating the previous record by thirty minutes. This is said to be a world's record for resistance swimming.

The "regulars" at the Franklin County Fairgrounds at Greenfield, Mass., are "high" on the subject of the filly by Peter the Gay in Roger Bourke's stable. Although broken in January, the little miss can march like a veteran.

The Midget, 2:08 1-4, behind which A. L. Kingsfisher Martin, of Rockville, Conn., has had many a merry ride, now is the property of Dr. H. W. Watson, of Haverhill, Mass., who has been brushing the mare on the snow of late.

A new French record for four-year-olds was set by Gen. de Harcourt (Gentile) on January 15, trotting a distance of 2275 meters at an average time of 1:27.6, which is a 2:30 gait.

Baka, which is on his way to this country, holds the Austrian record for six-year-olds over a distance of 3400 meters (about one and one-half miles) of 1:22.2, which is at the rate of 2.11 per mile, instead of 2.09 3-4, previously reported.

R. Earl Fink, of the Crescent A. C., Brooklyn, won the squash tennis championship of New Jersey at the Montclair A. C. Fink defeated John Taylor of Princeton club, 17-17, 13-15, 15-11 in the final match for the title.

Word has been received at Amherst college of the appointment of Prof. Henry W. Swasey, '15, now a member of the faculty of New Hampshire college, as baseball coach at that institution. Prof. Swasey relieves Head Coach and Director of Athletics, Cornell of the responsibilities he has held for some years as coach of the baseball team.

A. B. Craven, a California Student, has been elected captain of the Oxford University Lawn Tennis club for 1922. Mr. Craven's distinction at Wimbledon tournament last June in a stubbornly lost match against A. Dismar Koole of Holland. The battle lasted two hours and a half with resulting scores of 6-4, 6-7, 6-4, 6-2.

The leading long-distance swimmers in the world are to be invited to compete in a common tournament this year at swimming in the English channel. It is announced at London. An international relay race, open to teams of men and women, may also be organized for the Channel coast.

The Naval Academy expects its first year or plebe crew as well as its upper crew to race against Harvard and Princeton on May 6. The plebe crew of this year is somewhat heavier and stronger than usual.
